From the Vicarage

Many of you will remember the late, great actor and comedian Peter Sellers – perhaps as the accident-prone French detective Inspector Clouseau in the *Pink Panther* series of films, or in some of the other roles that he played. Sitting with a cup of tea in front of the TV and flicking through the channels recently, I came across one of his earlier films - *Heavens Above!* In it, he plays a vicar. As you can imagine, I was instantly hooked, and ended up spending much longer over my cup of tea than I had meant to.

In the film Sellers' character is appointed to a well-to-do parish – completely by mistake. Practising what he preaches, he scandalises his parishioners by taking in various waifs and strays, appointing a dustman as churchwarden, and persuading a local landowner to provide free food for the townspeople. Nobody ever expected him to take Christianity *that* seriously, and in the resulting chaos it becomes clear that he really will have to go – but how? The Church comes up with a solution – appoint him Bishop of Outer Space! He ends up in orbit, warbling hymns about love and forgiveness to a global audience as he circles the Earth.

It was very funny to watch, of course – but it also contained a grain of truth. Just as Sellers' vicar character ended up with little thanks for his sincerity, so not everything Jesus said and did suited everyone. As I write Holy Week is approaching, when Christians remember how Jesus, too, practised what he preached, and how it all ended on the cross. But Easter reminds us that his story doesn't end there, but continues in the lives of those who set out to follow him. Happy Easter! Brian



The Village Hall Committee has had a strange month with things suddenly stopping working only to start up again soon after. The top oven wasn't working one week - we sought help to get it fixed, discussed it at the monthly meeting only for it to work the following week. The projector screen jumped off the ceiling – we were quoted £1300 for its replacement and then John Carter came to our rescue and managed to secure the existing screen more securely with wooden battens and lots of elbow grease. During Film Club the sound system suddenly stopped working and despite the concerted efforts of Bob and an army of helpers, the film club had to be reconvened for the following week, involving a fair amount of reorganisation. The sound system is now working perfectly of course. The banner about the Farmers Market, which is normally suspended at the Dover entrance to the village, had disappeared and has now been replaced – but this banner also keeps falling down and our Chairman is spending a lot of his time up to his ankles in mud as he climbs over fences in efforts to keep the banner (or flag?) flying. We are working on a more permanent solution.

Short of calling in Ghostbusters to address the various gremlins at the village hall (did I mention the flickering lights) the Committee and its volunteers have spent a lot of time trying to overcome all of these issues. As they do every month. Because to keep the hall running takes an army of volunteers to fix things or to hang around for builders, electricians, carpenters or painters when we can't. It requires someone to answer phone calls, deal with emergency call outs, handle paperwork or help get the hall ready for the myriad of activities that take place in the hall. 

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A visitor from Canada was passing compliments on the meals we served while they stayed with us, which led to a fascinating conversation on Farmers' Markets. The one they visit at home sells frozen meat, has street entertainers and is much more of a fair than ours is. Vans sell refreshments which are consumed walking round the market. There are few or no places to sit and chat.

Riccardo Vecchio from the University of Naples has done some research into the differences between European and American Farmers Markets. He looked at the resurgence of farmers' markets and the reasons why. He states that the first farmers' markets in the USA were in the 17th century, then steadily declined as towns expanded and modern food distribution methods came into being. In the States during 1970s, economic factors led food producers to look at improving profits and consumers became more interested in fresh local foods. Market organisers took a percentage of the stallholder's income for the day.

Riccardo refers to an evaluation of Farmers' Markets in the UK by Holloway and Kneafsey. In the British Farmers' Markets there is an underlying interest in localness, naturalness and personal trust as well as a sense of community. Whilst accepting that the food was not the cheapest available, customers recognized the intrinsic quality of the food; the farmers valued 'the human level interactions'. Other key factors which were mentioned were the community aspects of Farmers' Markets and the pleasant atmosphere. In his conclusion, Riccardo emphasizes the social atmosphere amongst other factors.

Much of what he includes in his paper reflects the philosophy of Capel le Ferne's Market. It was set up by members of the village hall committee as a service to the local community – residents of Capel le Ferne and surrounding villages as well as local producers. When the Market first started many producers 'dipped their toes in the water', moving on to larger venues once they had established themselves. Others completed market research to establish the degree of interest in their products. Assessing the degree of interest helps producers decide how regularly to attend and to avoid over production. The Market has responded to this by ensuring the basics are there every week, with guest stalls of items for special occasions. As we move into spring we anticipate the return of plants.

The stallholders are happy to talk about their produce and its provenance – all year round tomatoes are Kent grown, as are the apples. Soft fruit in season comes from just up the road and the meat is from Brookland; cakes are baked in Hawkinge and Farthingloe. Deli products are locally made as is the bread – and without preservatives. For customers convenience seasonal fruit and vegetables are supplemented by some direct from Covent Garden. One shop at the vegetable stall will reveal Paul's skill at selecting the best.

One of the keystones of farmers' markets has been referred to as trust. Riccardo in his paper mentioned food scares over recent years. At the market customers can chat to the stall holders about animal welfare, about use (or rather lack of use) of chemicals and synthetic ingredients.

As part of its service to the community, Capel has a postal service run by volunteers. Unlike American markets, Capel relies heavily on volunteers – setting up, clearing up and serving refreshments and more significantly organizing stalls. Charges to stall holders are nominal, encouraging them to trial new ideas and new stores and ensuring they have enough income to live.

There are many other benefits to the market – it is a forum for residents to access Parish Council to discuss issues or seek advice. The community warden is a regular attendee. There are plenty of tables for customers to sit and enjoy a coffee and toasted teacake whilst catching up on village news. Tickets for a range of events are sold there, from the Railway Swing Band to St Radigund's Players to Downlands Travel roving round the room.

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<u>CAPEL-LE-FERNE PARISH COUNCIL</u> <u>Summary of some items discussed</u>



• Requests from public to address the Council, plus Surgery and Other Feedback – Address to Councillors on drainage issue with useful statistics provided from resident, relating to response on Appeal to Government Inspectorate that is underway for outline planning 107-127 Capel Street. Surgery feedback received - concerns expressed on change of use application at Bracknell House, Helena Road, on possible property use becoming House of Multiple Occupancy, the retention of existing hedgerow and parking issues. **Defibrillator**: Being installed within next two weeks on the Village Hall, near to front door. A demonstration meeting to be arranged for anyone to attend. One CCTV camera is being re-adjusted to cover the location area. • **Traffic Management:** Councillors received an approximate cost on carrying out a "traffic survey" on the B2011 to provide the Parish Council with the necessary "up to date" statistic data for the future of Traffic Management on this road. This was agreed and would be used to possibly purchase from Kent Highways, a replacement/new Vehicle Activated Sign on the New Dover Road, depending on evidence the survey provides and if criteria required by KCC is met. • **Planning:** Applications received: 10 Avondale Road; Hurst Lodge, Hurst Lane; 136 New Dover Road; Bracknell House (change of use); Battle of Britain Memorial (Entertainment Licence); and Appeal for 107-127 Capel Street outline development (Council response read out to those present and agreed for submitting to Government Inspectorate). The status of all these are reported and full details available on Dover District Council website: <u>https://www.dover.gov.uk</u> >Planning >Planning-Applications >Dietoisons

DDC Review of Local Plan: The Village Questionnaire is now being analysed by 3 Council Members to form statistical data. This will be used to respond to the Plan when Dover District Council submit for Public Consultation. The data, when completed, will also be used to form a document "Capel-le-Ferne Community Plan 2018". Watch this space! • Neighbourhood Watch: Crime reported of 4 hubs caps stolen from vehicle. Some "Crime prevention/education and awareness" advice agreed to be published in Grapevine, space permitting. Dog fouling reported from DDC with 10 perpetrators taken to court resulting in 9 prosecuted. Inconsiderate parking leaflet to be delivered by Community Warden to various roads mentioned. Enforcement of this is a particularly difficult exercise, due to lack of agency/authority intervention. The Parish Council will continue to monitor and arrange education/awareness to offenders. Speed Watch: No report due to absence of delegate. • Recreation and Other Equipment: Cleaning - the two bus shelters that the Parish Council own, i.e. adjacent to Helena Road and outside Battle of Britain Memorial (Folkestone bound) have been cleaned, together with the tri-picnic tables and benches on the playing field. Some street name signs are programmed for cleaning. • Highways: Request received from delegate to meet with Councillor responsible for Highway Management will be arranged. • Public Rights of Way: Delegate to arrange investigation with Town Sprucer/Community Payback on use of services in Capel. • Other: A Community Bus Scheme is being investigated further and talks will be taking place with a Company on whether their scheme could be used to cover a service via Blackbull Road, Hospital and Train Station to Folkestone town. More details will follow. Auction of Land - a letter of thanks from the Council has been sent expressing everyone's gratitude to the resident who purchased the Land on the Clifftop who has secured it to maintain the open space it provides. Parish Boundary Review - response to be submitted to incorporate Capel, Alkham and Hougham as an entity.

Next Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday, 17th April 2018 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall (Small Hall).





KCC drastically reduces bus savings

Proposed reductions to subsidised bus routes in Kent have been drastically scaled back following positive talks with bus companies and the decision by KCC to reduce the required savings from $\pounds 2.25$ million to $\pounds 455,000$ in this coming financial year.

Subsidised bus services represent just 3% of the network in Kent. The remaining 97% of services are run by commercial or community operators. Following discussions with bus companies Stagecoach and Go Coach, proposals to move a small number of services from public subsidy to commercially-operated routes, are expected to go out to public consultation in April.

These changes are designed to protect school services and ensure communities currently served by a subsidised route will not lose out, while providing necessary budget savings. These services are mirrored by existing commercial services and could be served by them with some slight network changes. There will be full local consultation in April on the proposed changes. The council is clear that no further changes to the subsidised bus network are proposed. Cabinet Member for Highways, Mike Whiting, said: "I am grateful to both Stagecoach and Go Coach for these innovative proposals which will allow us to make the necessary savings to our budget this year. I was clear at the outset that any changes proposed would not affect school services or leave communities without a service, and I believe these proposals achieve that." Next month, the council will launch "The Big Conversation" to better understand what communities want from their public transport services and how they could be better organised to meet that need. More than £40 million of bus-related business is commissioned by Kent County Council. KCC's aim in holding the Big Conversation, is to maintain services, potentially improve rural access and deliver this at a lower cost. Kent County Council Leader Paul Carter, who announced the Big Conversation in January, said: "These big conversations will invite ideas about the possible alternative delivery models for rural bus services. What we envisage is replacing the conventional subsidised bus services and in its place, provide greater access for rural residents. This could include a taxi-bus style service which links rural communities to main-line commercial bus routes or community-led transport services, that's why we need to have these conversations – so we can see the bigger picture affecting rural residents and see what is going to work best for people, and we have set aside £500,000 to invest in new technology and encourage innovation."

Discussions will be held with parish councils, commercial and community transport providers, technology providers and ultimately culminate in a Rural Bus Summit in the Summer which will bring everyone together to discuss the way forward.

The proposals are due to be discussed by the Environment and Transport Cabinet Committee on Tuesday, March 20.

In the Dover West area I have arranged presentations which have been given to four parish councils already by the operator of a charity operated community passenger service. This service has the benefit of a door to door service. It is just a matter of booking a call. There is a small annual subscription fee, then you pay for each fare, but the cost of fares are almost a third cheaper to that of Stagecoach.

These busses will accept the elderly and young, plus passengers seated in wheel chairs during the journey. The drivers are fully qualified and first aid trained. The service operates 24/7 for 365. They will convey passengers direct to the William Harvey and Kent and Canterbury hospital and to local surgeries and pharmacies. This service will link villages with villages and hamlets and convey passengers to the towns of Dover and Folkestone. **Geoffrey Lymer, Kent County Councillor, Dover West Ward**


Coffee morning



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Hello Everyone,

After welcoming the members to the March meeting, our president gave a brief history about our speaker Mr Chris Longfield from the Kent Air Ambulance. We were given a very informative talk about the Kent Air Ambulance which started out originally at Rochester Airport and moved to Marden near Maidstone. With the help of a slide show we could see just how important their role is. The service operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. One of the biggest parts of their calls is for road accidents, but also medical and various other emergencies. On board the helicopter are a Doctor, Pilot, and Paramedic. We were told how much they have improved over the years to be able to save more lives with on board doctors now able to do small operations, give blood and whatever is needed to keep patients alive on the way to a hospital. Also after being assessed by the Doctor they will know, which is the best hospital for the patient to go too for their condition to receive the best treatment, which usually is about 20 minutes away. The pilot needs to be highly experienced to fly the helicopter which can reach speeds up to 150 miles per hour. The newer helicopters have a lot more room to manoeuvre around the patient, with extra space for equipment and seating. Chris was given a big thank you for his informative talk.

The Kent Air Ambulance Trust is a charity dependant on public and private donations. After a break for refreshments and lots of chattering it was time to catch up on our news and future events followed by the flying competition winners and the raffle with plenty of prizes.
