The building work is finally finished, a huge relief to the committee and hirers alike. It has been gratifying to hear the many compliments on the improvement to the entrance, particularly for those with mobility challenges. It has been noticeable how many more people in larger wheel chairs visit the hall. Of course, there are the inevitable teething problems which are being resolved as they are identified.

Reaction to the colour is mixed, but on the whole feedback is that it is bright and sunny, which is what the committee was aiming for. It is an entrance lobby rather than another room for use and so one socket – for the Christmas tree – was deemed to be sufficient. The bespoke bookshelves have meant that there is room for people to see the books more easily, whilst the corridor is now clear with room to move around the hall freely. Huge thanks go to Fred Leaning who has thoroughly cleaned the carpet, transforming it in the process. The building control inspector visited several times whilst the work was in progress and reviewed fire control arrangements on his final check. The doors comply with current regulations and he was impressed with the fire notices in the halls. In answer to one question, we assured him that the hiring agreement makes hirers aware of their responsibility to ensure that users are aware of safety while in the hall. As a recap, at the start of meetings the chair (or whoever is 'in charge') must point out where the fire exits are and arrange for everyone to meet at an agreed point – either in the car park or on the hard surface Multi Use Games Area. The hirer will need to make sure everyone is accounted for or, if anyone is missing, let the emergency services know how many people to look for in the building. Please remember to keep the cupboard doors by the small hall shut with the bolt – this means they will not obstruct the fire exit.

Many hirers previously complained to the committee about interruptions while they use the hall and the lack of security with unknown people being able to access the hall whist their event is in progress. The new doors address this issue and if used properly, need a key to open them from outside. Could we please ask organisers/hirers to ensure the hall is secure before leaving? Instructions are on the door. Facing the car park, the left hand door must be secured – life the handle and ensure the knob is turned horizontal. Check it is secure. The right hand door should just lock when shut. Please test it before you leave. If it hasn't locked just check that the knob on that door is horizontal. It should be, but someone may have inadvertently moved it. If you really can't get the doors to lock please ring Sally, Jayne or another committee member. The system is approved for fire safety and we have been advised we can't change it.

The new work programme for the next few years is being drawn up – if there is something you know needs repair please let one of the Trustees know, or write it in the comments book in the kitchen. It won't all happen at once and the new committee will need to prioritise the list early next year. The list will include redecoration (the kitchen is due for painting in December), some work in the ladies' toilets and kitchen; work on clearing out and improving storage has already begun.

The cinema club has started on a trial basis and as the saying goes, use it or lose it. These have proved popular in many villages and we are grateful to Bob for starting, so one is being arranged for the afternoon of 10<sup>th</sup> February 2018. With no Grapevine in January make sure you put the date in your diary now.

Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> 10.-11.00: collect any tables (£2.50 per table) required for Christmas. No need to pre order.

Reminder - none of the village hall chairs is suitable for hiring out.

Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> December and Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> January the market will be closed – the days before these are bank holidays and the stallholders deserve some time off

Tuesday 11th January MARKET RE-OPENS for produce. The crafters re-join the market in February.

There is a wide range of good quality farmers produce close at hand to delight your taste buds this Christmas. Meat and vegetables can be pre-ordered from Debbie (whether a bird in a bird in a bird a stuffed turkey cushion or boned leg of lamb) or Paul (specify items or ask for a vegetable box) ready for collection at the last December market or Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> December between 10.00 and 11.00 from the village hall. If you do order in advance make sure you bring your receipt with you – depending in how many other markets Paul and Debbie need to deliver to distribution may be delegated.

For those who ordered cakes from Barbara she is due at the market on 19th December. Our new cake ladies will be at the December markets so if you have not already y ordered something there is time to rectify this. Not to worry though, they will have a supply of cakes for that impulse purchase.

Mike has home smoked salmon to go with Derek's free range eggs. Try smoked salmon and scrambled egg for a special breakfast or light supper over the festive season. If someone has spent too much time in the kitchen then an easy meal is a light buffet - Debbie's cheese stall has a variety of local cheeses to compliment the delicatessen foods on Mike's stall. Paul (Usher has returned with his fruit and vegetables) can provide something to accompany then and Kevin has his specialty apple and preserves. Farthingloe Farm will be at the December markets with their homemade pies as well as pastries and breads. Many of these are made especially for the Farmers' Market, so not available elsewhere.

If you're stuck for present ideas pop in and see what the crafters, including pupils from Beacon School, have on sale.

In winter, soup can be a hearty and economical meal. Try making a soup out of all the leftover Christmas vegetables. Gently soften some diced onions and small potato chunks in a mix of oil and butter. (The oil stops the butter burning, the butter adds flavour). Once soft put into a suitable size pan, add the leftover vegetables. Make stock – either use a stock cube or boil the broken turkey carcass in enough water to cover the bird with a carrot and onion for about three hours, making sure it doesn't boil dry. Add the stock to the prepared vegetables. If feeling adventurous add a teaspoon of curry powder. Bring to the boil then simmer for 30-40 minutes. Put into a liquidiser or use a hand blender to breakdown any lumps. Season and add cream, yogurt or crème fraiche to taste. Serve with well buttered chunks of bread.

### CAPEL-LE-FERNE PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of some items discussed at meetings

<u>vii idouday, ee itotoiliboi eoer</u>

• <u>Requests from public to address the Council, plus Surgery and Other Feedback</u>: Grass verge/pavement reinstatement opposite Jarvis Homes development. Plans submitted on an application of a property confusing. Affinity water work in Lancaster Avenue causing chaos and request for lights on roadside signage. Water logged Petanque Court. Request for provision of tactile drop kerbs at entrance to Village Hall. <u>Defibrillator:</u> Councillors and members of the Village Hall Management Committee received a demonstration on using a defibrillator from member of Kent Association of Local Councils and expressing the need for the provision of one in our community. Following this, it was unanimously agreed to purchase one, which will be sited outside the Village Hall.

• <u>Traffic Management</u>: Disappointment expressed on response letter sent from Kent County Councillor Cabinet Member for Planning, Highways etc., to our MP, following campaign by Parish/District/County Councillors to have the 40mph signage on B2011 (Dover end) relocated nearer to Courtwood Roundabout. Relocation of 40mph zone to bottom of Dover Hill (Folkestone end of B2011) being investigated further with Shepway MP and Folkestone Town Council. Speeding issues still a concern for Councillors on B2011, Old Dover Road and Capel Street and will continue to be pursued on ways to eliminate and educate drivers to keep to the speed zone limits. • <u>Planning</u>: Several applications' status reported – full details available on Dover District Council website.

#### **DDC Review of Local Plan**

Questionnaire to residents agreed with minor alterations to collection (See page 9 for more information).

• <u>Neighbourhood Watch</u>: Joint surgery of Community Warden and PSCO being investigated further, to be held at Farmers' Market session. Details to follow. Inconsiderate parking notices agreed to be compiled. <u>Capel Cares</u>: Details of volunteers' training to be provided for information. • <u>Recreation Equipment</u>: Works to installation to Zip-wire agreed and will be completed by contractor in mid-January, together with replacement of todler swing seats. Capel Groundworks to be contacted to restructure surface to eliminate flooding issue in Petanque Court. • <u>Highways</u>: New chevrons installed at Courtwood roundabout following report by Parish Council to Kent Highways. Also reported the lack of roundabout signage on approach to area. Grass verges reinstated by contractors for Affinity Water, who will also be planting more daffodil bulbs in areas of B2011 works. • <u>Public Rights of Way</u>: An autumn trim has taken place on most PROW around and in the village. • <u>Other</u>: Councillors discussed next year's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the end of World War 1. Several residents have started to crochet or knit poppies for display on the Memorial Plinth in Lancaster Avenue. Some have already been displayed and look excellent – thank you. With this in mind, the Parish Council are hoping anyone who can crochet or knit, to join in and add now to the surrounding fence. It is envisaged a collection of 100 poppies, can be stored, to replace and display next year by 11<sup>th</sup> November 2018, alongside a ceremony to commemorate this special date. If you can help, please do. Poppies for next year's commemorations can be delivered for storage to Parish Clerk (address below). Watch this space.

### Coming to your household in the New Year The Capel Community Plan Questionnaire

As part of the Local Plan Review Dover District Council are investigating possible sites for future development throughout the District.

The Community Plan Questionnaire gives an opportunity for everyone to make themselves heard and provides a mechanism for you to have your say.

For example, would you like to see more open spaces, improved social and leisure facilities, more effective public transport and traffic control measures, better access to health care and housing provision?

The Questionnaire has a very important role to play in setting out a vision for our village and it can be used in the formulation of Parish Council's response to the Dover District Council's Local Plan.

It can also be used to lobby other service providers (such as mobile phone operators, water and electricity suppliers, KCC Highways, etc.,) if it is established through the survey that there are for example, problems with services or existing infrastructure in the village.

Depending on the results of the survey the findings could be used to support funding bids to improve existing infrastructure in the village.

The questionnaire will be delivered with your February Grapevine and collected in week beginning 10<sup>th</sup> February to deadline date of 20<sup>th</sup> February. There will also be two sessions arranged with Councillors being available to answer questions. Dates and times will be available on questionnaire.

### Testing the temperature for pharmacy needs in Kent


How often do you use your local pharmacy? Does your town need more? These are some of the questions being put to Kent residents in a new consultation. *Pharmaceutical Needs Assessments (PNAs) are used by commissioners such as Kent County Council and local NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups to identify local health needs that could be addressed by these services, and by NHS England to decide whether to approve applications for new pharmacies in an area.* 

Residents and health professionals are being asked for their views in a brief questionnaire. KCC Deputy Director of Public Health, Allison Duggal said: "We have a statutory responsibility to look at the need for pharmaceutical services in Kent and the essential services they currently provide, including dispensing, providing support and advice on health and medicines, collection of medicine waste and supporting public health campaigns. We'd like to encourage as many people as possible to take part in this consultation so we can shape the future of pharmaceutical services in the county."

The important role that pharmacists can play is highlighted in the NHS England 'Stay Well This Winter' campaign which KCC supports, urging people feeling under the weather this winter to avoid A&E, and to instead consider visiting their local pharmacy for quick, early advice. This is especially important over the winter months – when people are more likely to become ill or feel poorly. Going to the pharmacy early will give you access to medication and advice on common ailments, but they can also:

- provide expert advice to manage long term conditions and let you know if you need to see your GP or make a hospital appointment;

A plan for the Estate was drawn up. Some properties were sold and the remainder were to be auctioned by Messrs: Protheroe and Morris of 67 & 68 Cheapside E.C. telephone 809 BANK.

The auction poster refers to the Cliffs Estate, Folkestone "Queen of the South". The estate overlooks the Warren Station and is ripe for the erection of bungalows, villas and marine residences. The photograph illustrating the catalogue is of the Leas looking towards the Warren. Solicitors acting for the vendor were Messrs: Powell and Rogers of 17 Essex Street. The Vendor, J.H. Retallack –Moloney is referred to in the Daily Mail Archives of 1903.

Listed were particulars, plan and conditions of sale of 100 plots of 'splendidly situated Freehold building land, to be sold by auction in a marquee on the Estate on Saturday July 18<sup>th</sup> 1903 at two o'clock precisely.' (A further auction was held on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> August). A special train left Cannon Street Station at 9.50, calling at New Cross. Tickets for conveyance by this train could be had at the offices of the solicitors, auctioneers or vendor, 5/- each, returnable to purchasers. Luncheon was provided free.

The poster says

"Important to Builders, Land Speculators and those seeking land for the erection of their own residences The Cliffs Estate Folkestone occupies a high and healthy position with splendid main road frontages, overlooks the Warren stations and FACES THE SEA. Tithe Free, Land Tax Free. Conveyance Free (except Stamp Duty). Abstracts Free" Information on the local area reads:

**Folkestone** has FIVE RAILWAY STATIONS – The Warren, The Central, The Harbour, The Junction and Shorncliffe Stations.

Folkestone is within easy distance of Sandgate, Hythe, Canterbury, Dover, Deal, Walmer, Shorncliffe Ashford and other places.


