From the vicarage

Other churches have tried it – quite successfully apparently – and I thought that we might try it too. Holding a special service for those planning to marry, or who were newly married, on St Valentine's Day, that is. To be honest, it fell a bit flat. What everyone seems to remember was that it was a bitterly cold afternoon, and nobody who came has asked when we're having the next one...


So who was St Valentine, and what did he have to do with cards, flowers or chocolates? It seems that around 270, when one of the Roman Emperors, possibly Claudius II, gave orders that anyone helping Christians should be arrested. In Rome someone of that name – possibly a priest – was imprisoned, tortured and executed. The Church declared him a saint and chose to remember him on 14th February. By chance, it was around this time that a pagan festival called Lupercalia was celebrated in Rome. This involved young men being matched with young women, along with other things - many of which would be banned today. Over time the connection between the Saint's Day and the old Roman festival has encouraged people to make the connection between Valentine and the celebrations that we are so familiar with.

There's more. Legend says that while awaiting execution Valentine was visited by his jailer's daughter. She was blind, and it is said that when he prayed, she miraculously received her sight. Sadly, there was to be no fairy-tale ending for them. Following his execution, a note was found in his cell, addressed to her and signed 'From Your Valentine.'

Many of you will be aware that despite their almost catastrophic decline nationwide, we have а population of hedgehogs within the village. The shelter and food offered by villagers who have houses and feeding stations in their gardens, and holes cut into the bottom of their fences to allow them to move about, have been so important in helping them. Unfortunately, increased road traffic, removal of hedges and increased development in the village are all putting pressures on them and they need our help more than ever.

With this in mind, a small group of villagers have come together to start a Hedgehog Rescue within the village - we are able to offer a high level of medical care, backed up by a local vet, as well as facilities for longer term care for those, for instance, that were born just too late to put on enough weight to hibernate. In fact, we already have a number of hedgehogs that concerned villagers managed to rescue in late December in Old Dover Road that would have undoubtedly not made it through the Winter without help, as well as other suffering from issues that require medical assistance. At present we are only able to take in hedgehogs that are found to be in trouble in Capel-le-Ferne - animals that are found out during the day, road casualties, other injuries, those juveniles that are too small (under 600grms) to hibernate - basically any hedgehog that is not acting as a nocturnal hedgehog should.

Summary of some items discussed

Tuesdays, 18th December 2018 and 15th January 2019

• <u>Traffic Management</u>: Comparison sought for speed limit roundels in Old Dover Road and on New Dover Road. This was received and agreed. Hopefully these will be installed via Kent Highways, when the weather improves and the ground surface is warmer. Further enquiries to be made on when the 40mph extensions on B2011 will be implemented. 40mph & 20mph stickers for wheelie-bins now available (page 12). Six accidents reported in two weeks at top of Dover Hill – communication sent to Kent County Councillor for Folkestone.

• <u>Requests from public to address the Council, plus</u> <u>Surgery and Other Feedback:</u> Planning Consultancy addressed meeting in December on holding a Public Meeting on development of Land 107-127 Capel Street – this is being held on Saturday, 26th January from 10am-2pm. The provision of Hedgehog Crossing signs for B2011, agreed to be investigated further.

• <u>Village Questionnaire Data Results:</u> Councillors have now completed the questionnaire and a working party was formed to read through before printing.

• <u>Planning</u>: Applications received; • Change of layout for 26 caravans Land Winehouse Lane/New Dover Road;

• Erection of single dwelling House at Longview, Old Dover Road; • Erection of agricultural buildings at Tumble Tye Farm; • Change of use and conversion of existing outbuilding to dwelling-house, erection of a front extension, etc., at Swinge Hill Cottage, Hurst Lane.

• <u>Highways</u>: Mud on road in Old Dover Road reported to Kent Highways, together with reinstatement of grass verge banks following recent works. • <u>Public Rights of Way</u>: Due to cold weather, muddy PROWs have now dried, but will continue to be monitored.

• <u>Speed Watch:</u> Sessions will resume in February when weather improves.

• <u>Capel Cares</u>: Summary of help, for six months up to end of December was read out; 60 Calls received, 25 individuals helped with companion sitting offering respite for carers, shopping, attending medical appointments, end of bereavement assistance etc.

• <u>Other:</u> Draft budget for 2019/20 presented and agreed at £37,818. This was an increase of 73p per month; £8.75 per annum; (i.e. £48.54 to £57.29 for a Band D Council Tax Charge). Increase in salaries agreed according to National Joint Council Scale of Awards. Charges for advertising in Grapevine to remain as in previous year detailed on page 5.

Hello everyone, Happy New Year

'New Year, New You' is the national campaign now underway with support in Kent to raise awareness of key lifestyle behaviours - such as smoking, drinking too much alcohol, inactivity and unhealthy eating their effect on people's health and the support available.

Drinking too much, smoking, inactivity and poor diets can have long term effects on people's emotional and physical health, leading to an increased risk of many types of cancer, heart and lung disease and stroke and early death. Try the 'How are You?' quiz or book up for a free Health Check* and find out more about a range of tools, tips and local support services that can help you at <u>www.oneyoukent.org.uk</u>

KCC Director for Public Health, Andrew Scott-Clark said: "People are becoming more aware but many still don't realise the harm that certain lifestyle behaviours are causing their health, in both the short and long term.

"Smoking and excessive alcohol consumption can lead to high blood pressure and also trigger an irregular heartbeat, both of which increase the risk of having a stroke. Heavy drinking increases the risk of having a stroke by more than three times. By doing something about one or all of these issues, you will reduce your risk of having a stroke along with many different types of cancer."

Smoking - Approximately 16.3% of Kent residents are smokers and while the number of smokers has fallen over recent years, many people find it hard to quit; tobacco remains the number one killer in England and a chief cause of long-term poor health with one in four hospital beds occupied by a smoker. In 2016/17 smoking attributable admissions in Kent accounted for 12,444 people.

Kent Community Health NHS Foundation Trust offers year-round support to quit smoking.Local services such as pharmacies and NHS quit clubs and "do it yourself" quit kits and digital tools (such as mobile apps) are available to support people who want to quit independently.More information can be found <u>www.oneyoukent.org.uk</u> and <u>www.kent.gov.uk/</u> <u>smokefree</u> Alternatively, ring 0300 123 1220 (option 1), or text 'QUIT' to 87023. You can also find more information at <u>www.kenthealthandwellbeing.nhs.uk</u>

<u>Alcohol</u> - The majority of the Kent population (79%) drink sensibly and in safe limits (scoring less than seven on AUDIT - an alcohol risk score) but approximately 254,000 people are drinking at higher risk levels. There are an estimated 16,000 dependent drinkers in Kent in need of some treatment and support.

KCC supports the national Dry January campaign and encourages residents to be aware of how much they are drinking by using the 'Know Your Score' interactive online test - <u>www.kent.gov.uk/knowyourscore</u> - which asks users a series of simple questions to help them gauge how the alcohol they are consuming could be affecting their health.

Depending on their score, appropriate advice about where to find help are then delivered by different experts and health professionals in a short video.

A range of formal and informal support is also available, such as AA and Smart Recovery (peer support) in Kent and Al-anon for friends, family and carers of alcoholics. KCC Public Health commissions specialist treatment providers to provide structured treatment for alcohol addiction. You can also find more information at <u>www.oneyoukent.org.uk</u>

Obesity

In 2016/17, the Active Lives survey reported that 63 per cent of Kent adults were classified as overweight or obese which is slightly higher than the national figure (61.3 per cent).

The best way to tackle obesity is to eat a healthy, reduced-calorie diet and to exercise regularly. Priorities focus on changeable factors such as helping families to improve poor diets and help for those who need to lose and maintain a healthy weight. KCC supports national initiatives such as Change4Life and One You, alongside community based weight management programmes for adults and fun activity based programmes for families with children and educational programmes in schools.

For advice about small changes you can make to improve your health and wellbeing, and find more support in your area regarding your lifestyle, see <u>www.oneyoukent.org.uk</u>

*If you're aged 40 to 74-years-old, you could also sign up for an NHS Health Check for advice on keeping yourself healthy and active. Your blood pressure, height and weight will be checked. You will be given a small finger prick test to check your blood cholesterol and you'll also be asked some questions about your lifestyle and family history. The check will identify the risk of you developing heart disease, kidney disease, stroke, diabetes or dementia in the future. Find out more at <u>www.oneyoukent.org.uk</u> (search for Health Checks) or call 0300 123 1220 (option 4) to find a clinic near you.

Andrew Scott-Clark added: "We want more people to get the help they need at the right time and this could be in a range of different ways. People do not have to struggle alone, we want them to seek support and information to help them live a healthier life. If people are depressed then we urge them to see their GPs or contact Live Well Kent - who provide community mental health support services - on 0800 567 76 99 and www.livewellkent.org.uk"



<u>CAPEL-LE-FERNE HISTORY - Reproduced from</u> <u>Folkestone and Hythe Gazette May 19, 1966</u>

Capel is a village of the modern age. It comprises new housing estates surrounded by agricultural land.

There are a few old houses. It is a thriving community in close proximity to Folkestone and Dover. Access to these two channel ports is quick and easy.

The main road connecting the two towns splits the village in two, piercing like an arrow through the heart. It does not kill but gives life and body for without it Capel would tend to become a remote and dying place.

When, nearly 40 years ago, the main road was built, Capel was very small and the majority of land was farmland. But on its completion the village was transformed.

Houses sprang up everywhere and - they are still going up today.

At first the attraction was relatively cheap land prices. But, as the place grew the attraction lay in the fact that it was a fast growing community that would serve the business community well.

And it is for that reason that it is growing still.

In recent years the number of young married couples moving into the village has grown considerably.

Their interests lie not in the village but outside it – where they work and where they have relatives.

Mr Dennis Cullen, Chairman of the Parish Council is well aware of this attitude but, as he says, you cannot blame them.

"There is little for them to do in the village. There is an over 60 club and two Women's Institutes but they do not interest young men. They want to get out. There is no cricket club and little social life so they go elsewhere."

Will things change as Capel continues to grow? Mr Cullen does not think so.

"Apart from old people there seems to be a tremendous apathy" he said. "A few years ago, a public meeting was held to discuss the future of the large playing fields in the centre of the village.

Nobody wanted to develop it as a useful recreation ground then and I do not think they want to do so now. Residents are content to be just residents, just eat and sleep there, nothing more."

But now there is hope that the playing fields will be utilised by the recently formed youth club.

Said leader Mr George Brown "Now that summer is approaching members want to be outdoors. They want to enjoy a game of cricket and other sports and the only way they can do that is to convert the fields from a rough patch of unused ground into a useful utility field. The only way this can be done is for them to do this themselves. Plans have already been made to begin the conversion and as soon as we get the necessary equipment work will begin." So at last Capel may have a traditional village green.

For Capel, being so new, is a Capel without a centre.

Mr William Collar, who jointly runs a newsagent and general stores with his wife said:

"When tourists pass through Capel they see nothing except houses. There is little else for them to see.

Capel has grown so quickly that it has lost something. The church which should be, and usually is, the central figure in the community life is so far away from the village.

To get to it means a long walk through country lanes and, during the winter, is not an attractive prospect. If we had a church built within the village it would do a great deal for Capel. People would be able to get together much more and become more sociable.

A few years ago we used to run a social club but the organiser left the village and the club collapsed. If the church were to run it I'm sure it would be a success.

Capel badly needs something to inject life into it, especially for the younger people".

The elderly residents however are well looked after. There is a bustling over 60s club which has a regularly high attendance. It meets every week in the village hall and only a few weeks ago it celebrated its ninth birthday.

There are also two women's institutes, evening and afternoon. Both enjoy a great deal of popularity. Mrs Kathleen Clarke, president of the Evening WI said "we are a growing club, as we will be while the village is growing. We have a membership of 40 and, being a small group, there is a spirit of friendliness. We cater for all age groups, especially the young married people who want to become part of Capel."

Miss H.M. Cheshire, President of the afternoon WI tell a similar story of success. "We are twice as large as the evening WI, none of the friendliness is lost" she said. "It is mainly the elderly people who attend and they love to sit and chat"

Lack of community spirit or not, the residents are extremely friendly. A new comer to the village, Rev. Richard Parson who was recently inducted as vicar of Capel and Alkham has noticed this after only 6 weeks.

"Every person here seems willing to make friends" he said. "They would pull together and help anyone who needed help. And they are so co-operative. Since I have led services at the parish church I have had many volunteers to transport people from their homes.

I have had many offers of help to organise the annual summer fete to be held in June and preparations are going ahead in earnest."

Mr Parsons is also doing all he can to help the youth club. At the moment he is negotiating for a new billiards table for the club, something which is in great demand. Like other residents he realises the need for a new church.

<u>CAPEL-LE-FERNE HISTORY - Reproduced from</u> <u>Folkestone and Hythe Gazette May 19, 1966</u>

"It is true that the present church is too far away and during the winter month presents many difficulties. But over the past four years £2,400 has been raised to build a new one. Plans have already been drawn up. But to build a new church some £15,000 would have to be raised. Because the village is so small - it has a population of under 2,000 – it would not be eligible for a grant".

Should a new church be built, the village would lose one of its oldest and most stately building. It was built during the Norman era by the monks of St Radigunds Abbey near Dover.

It is from the church that the name of the village is derived for, at one time, it stood in the middle of a small wood. The name means Chapel in the wood.

Inside the church, leading to the altar is a rood screen, typical of Saxon churches, made in stone.

Capel is also a favourite camping site for many holiday makers. There are six caravan sites and Dover Rural Council, which governs Capel, have refused many applications for further caravans.

The largest site is the Blue Channel, situated on the main road, with a capacity of 100 caravans. It is owned by Mr Lord Harris who moved to Capel 12 years ago.

"Many holidaymakers come here year after year and some have made Capel their permanent home" he said. "Capel is peaceful which so many people want these days and is near the sea and the famous Warren.

My business has expanded at a fast rate since I came here and I could have still more caravans and fill them up."

The Warren undoubtedly attracts many visitors; it is the Warren which yields on of the most fascinating stories to be heard.

In 1918, the cliffs began to slide. Great slabs went down and with one of them went a large Jacobean styled house. Two people sleeping in the house tried to get out but found a large boulder by the back door.



But when the house stopped falling it was absolutely level, not a window was broken and nobody was hurt. The garden, which went down with the house, remained intact and two fir trees are still in the Warren, in the part known as Eagles Nest.

Today that house stands, as solid as ever, near Charing, Kent. It was taken to pieces, brick by brick, window by window, and taken to the present site.

Capel has one other claim to fame. It is in all probability unique in as much as it is a village without a pub. There are two public houses, one at each end of the village, but both are outside the parish boundary. Yet neither would gain much custom but for Capel residents.

Capel le Ferne Primary School organised the 1966 pancake race 24 hours late because of the half term holiday.

The race was planned by the headmaster Mr R Winter with the aim of cementing relations between parents who lived in Capel and Hougham – Hougham Primary School had closed just over a year previously. The event had the added benefit of fundraising for a prayer desk for the new church.

Over 20 parents entered, so three separate races were run over a course marked out along Capel Street. Winners were Mrs Greenaway, Mrs Rye and Mrs Hayward. After the race, all the parents were able to examine paintings of pancake races and read poems about the event written by children.



"Additions to the amenities of Capel include a new seat and swings. The seat, which was given by the afternoon and evening WIs is now in place near the village hall.

It was erected by volunteers under the supervision of Mr G Boorman. Foundations for the swings, which were bought by the parish council, were also laid. As soon as the concrete has hardened the swings will be built"

IF YOU RECEIVE ONE OF THESE EMAILS/TEXT, DO NOT OPEN IT OR CLICK ON ANY LINKS. These scammers are maliciously targeting drivers, pretending to offer a refund or by issuing intimidating or threatening messages.

Usually these con artists are trying to pry information or money out of drivers using fake sites, which have been dressed up to look the Government site.

One reads: "FINAL REQUEST: DVLA Swansea have been trying to contact you, Click below for more information" followed by a bogus URL address.

Another reads "We would like to notify you that you still have an outstanding vehicle tax refund of £48.84 from an overpayment, despite our previous letters regarding your refund we are yet to receive your claim"

Action Fraud has received more than 5,000 reports about fake emails and texts purporting to be from TV Licensing. The messages contain links to genuine-looking websites that are designed to steal personal and financial information.

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.


