#### Strolling players on the Downs with Smuggling show

The beautiful, atmospheric ancient church of St Laurence in Hougham and will be visited by Sabotage Theatre Company on Saturday 8th August, to perform their new smuggling play Owlers by Zoe Hinks, as part of the Up on the Downs Big Summer Festival. Weaving local history and folklore, the story is inspired by a series of real events which led to the demise of the infamous Aldington Gang of smugglers, otherwise known as the Blues, when what started as a routine landing of contraband at Dover in 1826 ends in disaster. It follows the extraordinary lives of ordinary people when the world was turned upside down; Lighthouse Sisters, cross-dressing tub boys and the outlawed vicar who harboured contraband in his church. Owlers was piloted last year as part of JAM on the Marsh festival where it sold out. For some months the committee has been discussing what we could to do to improve the hall. There has been a wide variety of suggestions, all of which have been debated and the practicalities of each discussed. The start of a medium term project it has been agreed that the next part of the continuing modernisation of the hall is improving the front entrance to make the hall more welcoming, more secure and to stop the water seeping in through the front porch enclosure. The proposed inclusion of shelves for books should help 'tidy up' considerably.

Replacement lighting in the main hall is scheduled for August 3<sup>rd</sup> for one week – LED lights which will be dimmable, so they will be bright for sporting events and intimate for parties. Unfortunately the hall will need to be closed to enable the work to take place. Workmen will be on site during the day, in the evening there will be no lighting in the building and the scaffolding tower will remained erected. This means access to the hall represents a health and safety hazard. (Yes, we know this may seem overkill, but we have been informed once by someone hurting themselves using the hall during building works, so it's once bitten twice shy). The ceiling will be repainted once the fitting has been completed. At the time of writing the actual date is not known but it will entail another 3 days closure. Not exactly what we want, but there is little choice and we do want to keep the hall in god condition and somewhere people want to use.

LAST MONTH WE REMINDED HALL USERS OF THE NEED TO KEEP NOISE WITHIN REASONABLE LIMITS, <u>ESPECIALLY WHEN THE DOORS AND WINDOWS ARE OPEN.</u> We are aware some hirers may have missed this so once again: if the volume is raised, then doors and windows should be kept shut. Music should stop at 11.30pm. (Unless, a successful application for an extension has been made). REMEMBER THE HALL IS WELL USED BY MANY RESIDENTS AND IF WE LOSE THE LICENCES, THE IMPACT WILL BE FELT BY ALL THE ORGANISATIONS MEMBERS.

Capel has an active community and the village hall is well used, whether by the WI, Parish Council or by the other various organisations who meet for sports or leisure activities. There is something for all ages. Details of these are in the hall. Some, like short mat bowls are in the hall several times a week, others, like the gardeners' show are quarterly events. If you are new to the village or recently retired there are lots of opportunities to get involved either on a social basis or to join some of the committees. Most organisations are happy for you to attend taster session to see if the activities suit you. Details are in the hall or in Grapevine. \* There is some capacity for private hiring, so if you would like to organise a party come and have a look round. There are two halls, which can be hired separately or together. The main hall has plenty of tables and chairs and there is still space for dancing or running round. A professional PA system means you can hear the music or speaker if you have one - we are happy to show people how to use it, in fact we'd rather give a demonstration that have someone find out by trial and error how it works - or doesn't. Problems have been reported when microphones are not switched off after use. Trustees are therefore suggesting that the batteries are removed when not in use and hirers bring batteries for their event. This will ensure that the microphone will last the duration of your event. There is a stage with curtains - you could use this for the disco, band, speaker or you could put some chairs there so adults can sit and watch the children run around on the main floor. For AV events there is an electrically driven projection screen, whilst for that very special party there is a net to release balloons. The small hall is perfect for more intimate groups or meetings, or can be used as the chill out space or food/drink service area. Both halls have use of the kitchen – including instant boiling water (capacity up to 100 cups in 15 minutes) and plenty of china, mugs and cups. A separate hand washing sink complies with Food Hygiene Regulations. The electrically operated shutter allows you to close the kitchen off so your guests can party on while the washer uppers tidy up. Hire either or both halls, depending on how much space you need. Licenced for most things (except hypnosis and boxing) including sale of alcohol, PRS, raffles. If you would like to start a new club or activity then talk to the letting secretary about when a regular booking can be made.

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## **TO AND FRO CARS**



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Plantlife's hugely successful 'Bee Scene' survey has been rescued by family-owned cereal maker Nature's Path, after its original funding had ended. Over 30,000 children have already taken part in the wild flower survey since its launch in 2010. Now thousands more will have the opportunity to explore the nature on their doorstep and learn about the wild flowers growing there. Families can discover whether their local area is good for bumblebees by looking for bee-friendly wild flowers such as foxgloves, dandelions and clovers in their local green spaces. The results are then uploaded onto a virtual meadow map of the UK.

**The survey** raises awareness and understanding in children of the importance of biodiversity in their local area, starting them on a path to enjoying wild flowers and realising their importance as part of our natural heritage. It also helps them understand the importance of wild plants for our declining pollinators. 90% of teachers who did the survey reported that 'Bee scene' had given them new learning about the natural environment and helped pupils understand that different wild plants are important for bees.

**Nature's Path** has a strong commitment to sustainability and the natural environment and has stepped in to enable the Bee Scene initiative to reach many thousands more children and families this year after its National Lottery funding ended. A spokesperson comments "As an organic, family owned company, with a strong commitment to the natural environment we recognise the importance of educating children early about the importance of our wild flowers and the pollinators that rely on them. We are thrilled to be able to support Plantlife to continue this fantastic survey, so that many more children and families can take part and 'Bee Scene'. 'Bee Scene' is a simple and effective way to encourage children and their families into their local parks or countryside - to enjoy them together away from the television screen, computer games and other pressures of modern life. By using a simple flower key, they are

Road verges are one of the most important, best loved and frequently viewed habitats in the country... So why are they still being destroyed? A new Plantlife study shows that Britain's road verges are home to 703 species of wild plants, more than in any other part of our landscape, and 87 of them are either threatened with extinction or heading that way. In addition, 88% of these wild plants provide nectar and pollen for bees and other insects, making road verges essential refuges for insect life; bird's-foot trefoil alone is a food plant for 132 species of insect.

In addition, 21 of the 25 Nation's Favourite Wildflowers grow on road verges. From cowslips and bluebells in spring to swathes of cow parsley and ox-eye daisies in early summer, our verges are home to most of the 25 favourite wild flowers as voted for by the public. And with 30 million drivers in the UK, they're the most frequently viewed habitat too, providing many people with their only regular daily contact with nature. But in much of Britain road verges are still being needlessly cut down in full flower threatening the wildflowers and the wildlife that depend on them. Many councils have already started cutting verges - much too early in the year for flowers to be able set seed, and greatly reducing one of the most important food banks for our ailing bees and other pollinators.

Dr Trevor Dines, Plantlife's Botanical Specialist, explains, "Over 97% of meadows have been destroyed in England since the 1930s. In many areas, rural road verges are the last remaining stretches of natural habitat for our wildlife. Road safety is the absolute priority, but we know that verges can be managed better for wildlife whilst remaining safe for motorists. This means adopting some simple changes to management – like a delay in cutting to allow seed to be set - so that wildflowers can thrive".

Plantlife has produced new management guidelines and is urging the public to sign a petition asking local councils to adopt them. Some councils are leading the way. Trials in Dorset, for example, are investigating how to combat the over-vigorous growth of grass on fertile verges (which is both detrimental to wildflowers and obscures driver sight-lines), by stripping turf, using semi-parasitic yellow rattle to stunt grass growth and even grazing verges with sheep. Plantlife is helping to showcase the work of councils like Dorset to show others that it can be done. Our guidelines are being currently being applied to 11,700 km of verge covering 2,300 hectares of verges – that's equivalent to 2.5 times the area of remaining upland hay meadow in the UK - and with the public's support we can do even more.

Dr Dines adds, "If we just give them a chance, wildflowers can return. Meadow crane's-bill was once widespread in meadows – hence its name – but is now more commonly found on road verges. It spreads readily when cutting is delayed and it's allowed to set seed. Maybe it's time to change its name to "verge crane's-bill".



As schools break up for the Summer period, many parents will be applying for the Young Persons Travel Pass, ready for when their children start the school's Autumn trimester. These passes are issued under a discretionary scheme, operated by Kent County Council, over the last few years to help ease the financial pressures on the shoulders of many parents. The scheme is temporarily in place to provide subsidised bus travel for children aged from 7-11 years of age, for 16-21 year olds in care or care leavers, also young carers who are 16-18 and in full time education and all applicants must reside in Kent.

Kent County Council receives no funding from Central Government to run this scheme. The pass offers discounted bus travel from Monday to Friday. Kent County Council has to reimburse the bus operators for the fares that would otherwise have been paid for by the parents.

On average each pass costs £588, which is offset by a charge to parents. Due to budget pressures, Kent County Council proposes a £50 reduction in the subsidy for the full cost of the pass, raising the price to the user by £50 from 3rd September 2015. This will mean £250 is paid towards the pass by the parent and the remaining cost of £338 is paid by Kent County Council. The Young Persons Travel Pass remains one of the most generous schemes of its kind outside the greater London area to access Kent public bus transport network from 06h00-19h00, Monday to Friday, from 3rd September to 31st July. Children who receive free school meals, their parents pay £100 towards the cost of the pass for the academic year. There is no charge for young carers or young people in care. To ensure you receive the Young Persons Travel Pass for the start of the first trimester in September, KCC must receive your application BEFORE Friday the 17 July 2015. Should you fail to get your application in by the 17 July, it is unlikely you will receive the Young Persons Travel Pass in time for the start of the new term in September AND you will be required to pay the standard fare, which is non-refundable; until as such time you receive your pass. In my newsletter article for June, where I expressed concerns regarding the limited amount of time of up to only 72 hours, for obtaining of a pass code from DVLA, prior to your intention to hire a car, that pass code being your consent for the car hire company to contact DVLA to confirm or negate whether your licence has endorsements, which could affect whether you pay a higher insurance premium or even be able to hire a car. The Government has now increased that period from 3 days to 3 weeks to obtain an access code from the DVLA prior to approaching a car hire company. The support by your Kent Councillor and Dover District/Ward Councillor, as a result of many emails being sent to and fro since June, has resulted in an achievement of the following result.

Kent County Council has allocated £50,000 from its Local Transport Plan in 2015/16 for a trial public health scheme across the county. The trial is likely to take place in three or four wards and involve signed-only 20 miles per hour speed limits. The County Council has ranked all wards across the county in relation to the following public health measures:

1) Admission rate per 10,000 resident population for COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease) and asthma by ward, 2011/12 to 2013/14; 2) Obese children rates per 100 by ward; 3) Admission rate per 10,000 resident population for Road Traffic Collisions by ward, 2011/12 to 2013/14; 4) Percentage of road traffic collisions on roads where the speed limit is 30 miles per hour involving pedestrians or pedal cyclists by ward, 01.07.2011 to 30.06.2014.

Confirmation that Capel-le-Ferne ward ranked in the top four across the county on a combination of these measures. However, this relates to the ward, which covers a much larger geographic area than just the village. Capel-le-Ferne is likely to be included in the trial but currently there will be checking on the technical feasibility of the scheme. As mentioned, this trial will involve traffic signs only and there will be no new traffic calming features introduced as part of the scheme. The trial is likely to cover most of the residential roads in Capel-le-Ferne village, including Capel Street but excluding B2011.

Although the scheme will be a trial, the County Council must follow the same process as for any other permanent traffic regulation order. As such, Capel-le-Ferne Parish Council and other local elected representatives, will be consulted before any scheme is implemented.






