The beautiful, atmospheric ancient church of St Laurence in Hougham and will be visited by Sabotage Theatre Company on Saturday 8th August, to perform their new smuggling play *Owlers* by Zoe Hinks, as part of the Up on the Downs Big Summer Festival. Weaving local history and folklore, the story is inspired by a series of real events which led to the demise of the infamous Aldington Gang of smugglers, otherwise known as the Blues, when what started as a routine landing of contraband at Dover in 1826 ends in disaster. It follows the extraordinary lives of ordinary people when the world was turned upside down; Lighthouse Sisters, cross-dressing tub boys and the outlawed vicar who harboured contraband in his church. Owlers was piloted last year as part of JAM on the Marsh festival where it sold out. Hougham will be the company's final performance in an unusual tour across Sussex and Kent where historical buildings and forest clearings have been their theatres. "Creatively brilliant" Edward Armitage, Artistic Director of J.A.M. Sabotage Theatre brings original rural theatre to places of natural beauty and historical significance. The company has a very strong environmental ethos and the sets and costumes are made from recycled/reclaimed materials. 'Owlers', which is an old Kentish word for 'smugglers', was developed using folklore and true stories surrounding the arrest of the notorious gang leader, George Ransley. "I cried at the end, it was beautiful" Gail Duff, founder of TRADS Folk Art. The committee has been discussing what we could to do to improve the hall. If you have any thoughts or suggestions please let us know.

Replacement lighting in the main hall is scheduled for the summer holidays – LED lights which will be dimmable, so they will be bright for sporting events and intimate for parties. The ceiling will be repainted once the fitting has been completed.

Conversations continue about how to improve the front entrance – there are almost too many options, some more cost effective than others, whilst others are extremely disruptive, so it will take a while to reach a sensible decision.

We have also explored options for reopening the post office and had one or two offers of help. We have seen the range of services has been drastically reduced and the income available to post masters/mistresses has been reduced. We have also heard that Post Offices Limited will not support re-opening the post office in Capel le Ferne. This has been a huge disappointment.

LAST MONTH WE REMINDED HALL USERS OF THE NEED TO KEEP NOISE WITHIN REASONABLE LIMITS,

ESPECIALLY WHEN THE DOORS AND WINDOWS. We are aware some hirers may have missed this so once again: if the volume is raised then doors and windows should be kept shut. Music should stop at 11.30pm (Unless a successful application for an extension has been made). REMEMBER THE HALL IS WELL USED BY MANY RESIDENTS AND IF WE LOSE THE LICENCES THE IMPACT WILL BE FELT BY ALL THE ORGANISATIONS and MEMBERS.

Capel has an active community and the village hall is well used, whether by the Spitfire Judo Club or the East Kent Bridge Club or by the other various organisations who meet for sports or leisure activities. There is something for all ages. Details of these are in the hall. Some, like short mat bowls are in the hall several times a week, others like the bird show are annual events.

If you are new to the village or recently retired there are lots of opportunities to get involved either on a social basis or to join some of the committees. Most organisations are happy for you to attend taster session to see if the activities suit you. Details are in the hall or in Grapevine.

* There is some capacity for private hiring, so if you would like to organise a party, come and have a look round. There are two halls which can be hired separately or together.

The main hall has plenty of tables and chairs and there is still space for dancing or running round. A PA system means you can hear the music or speaker if you have one – we are happy to show people how to use it. There is a stage with curtains – you could use this for the disco, band, speaker or you could put some chairs there so adults can sit and watch the children run around on the main floor. For AV events there is an electrically driven projection screen, whilst for that very special party there is a net to let release balloons. The small hall is perfect for more intimate groups or meetings, or can be used as the chill out space or food/drink service area.


Both halls have use of the kitchen – including instant boiling water (capacity up to 100 cups in 15 minutes) and plenty of china, mugs and cups. A separate hand washing sink complies with Food Hygiene Regulations. The electrically operated shutter allows you to close the kitchen off so your guest can party on while the washer uppers tidy up.

Hire either or both halls, depending on how much space you need. Licenced for most things (except hypnosis and boxing) including sale of alcohol, PRS, raffles.

If you would like to start a new club or activity then talk to the letting secretary about when a regular booking can be made.

While helping at weekends to get the New Village Hall completed, several of us realised the building should have a Youth Club. At the time, some older youngsters were meeting at a resident's home (not something to be recommended today I hear)! A group of parents got together and formed a committee. Such was the adult response that 2 groups were created for each Thursday; youngsters 10-13ish and up to age 18. After affiliating with the area association, some of us went on their start-up course. Useful, but like most things in life, I learnt most being amongst the young people. Here I must thank that first group, from whom I learned to keep smiling even if I wanted to break down and cry. We've all been there parents.

The Thursday evenings were popular with table tennis, snooker and pool and of course, indoor football. Fund-raising was the next task. The Youth Club organised their first table (boot) fayre in the Village, filmed horse racing nights and quiz evenings - the later still the main fund raising events. With funds we were able to do extra activities; including the Kearsney Camping weekends, once experiencing a huge thunderstorm whilst huddled in our tents, Chessington Theme Park I remember was fun, one year we went away for a week, our local policeman (yes we had one in those days) camped with us and so impressed were the youngsters they brought him a present. There is a video of that camp, so if anyone has a copy, I would love to see it again. Sadly, we lost three of our leaders and several young people prematurely. My thoughts are with their families.

I am finally, finally retiring – as someone said, you have more of these than Frank Sinatra, honestly only one other. I hadn't had my £5 back we all put in at the start up, so I thought I had better come back (still not got it though)!

The young people still enjoy the old games, despite this electronic age. Perhaps the attention span is a little less and having a film night complete with a projector, would seem weird to them now. There are 50 youngsters enjoying 1^{st} and 3^{rd} Thursday at the present, but it depends solely on adult volunteers and so parents, Dads particularly, think about helping to keep it going.

The youngsters sent me white haired, but they have kept me "young at heart". I thank them.



Planning Application that had been submitted to Dover District Council Planning Authority. It was agreed that the comments covered all aspects required in relation to the response for the Planning Authority, with the exception of a couple of items deemed from residents at the recent open display of the plans, i.e. extension of 30mph speed limit on Old Dover Road and bridleway at London House, these to be included. Thanks were expressed to those Councillors for their research undertaken and delivering comprehensive comments. A response from these comments would be sent, to include a summary of points raised, referral to previous response to Jarvis Homes of which Developers seem to have taken no notice and the provision of a full landscape scheme to include appropriate buffer zone maintenance. • Other – Flower boxes have sponsors; Cllr: Shaw, Cherry Leppard and Mick Marshall (Primary School) to adopt the two Dover end of village. Lighthouse Inn to adopt one in Old Dover Road - Cllr: Shaw to liaise with them on possibly adopting both. Awaiting confirmation from Battle of Britain Memorial Trust Site if they will adopt the two Folkestone end of village. Kent Council Community Safety and Public Protection Services - Parish Council received official notification of the retirement of Dave Bish (Community Warden) and the identification of a permanent replacement for our area (and Hawkinge). Paul James is tom return to the village as from 22nd June 2015. Post Office Services - Following requests for reinstatement of Post Office, they had considered the request, but had decided not to open an additional branch facility at this time.



My name is Gabrielle, I work with some guys who live in Capel. We are at present trying to raise funds for a sensory garden for the guys who are both blind. However, I was wondering if you have in the local community someone with time on their hands and enjoys gardening that could visit the guys maybe once or twice a week, in order to cut down on the garden getting out of hand. We will have a vegetable garden too when it's all done, so whoever might take this on will be welcome to some freshly grown vegetables along with making friends with the guys and sharing a cup of tea. Look forward to hearing from you. Tel: 07919403125 Well here we are approaching the Summer holiday period. Your holiday is all arranged. Many of you will be flying to your holiday destination. You arrive at your resort and decide that you will hire a small car, whilst there, in order to explore the area. In the past it has been fairly straight forward. You would take your paper and your card driving licence. The reasons for the two, is the paper licence evidences your licence is clean or that you may have an endorsement or two. This would allow a decision as to whether the car hire company would risk loaning a car to you, but more to the point, would determine how much your car hire insurance would be for the period of the rental. The plastic card part of the licence would be to comply with EU regulations for uniformity of documentation. But this has all changed, for the DVLA has scrapped the paper part of your licence, so if you apply for a licence now you will only receive the European acknowledged plastic card licence. If you still hold the paper licence too, the DVLA advise that you destroy it immediately. But, before you do, read on. So you are abroad on holiday and in the car hire rental reception in the process of hiring a little car, so how do you prove you have a clean licence or one or more endorsements, for you have scrapped your paper licence which would have had that information. Well the car hire company will still need to check the up to date information regarding your driving history. They will need to contact the DVLA direct, but they will have to provide a code that you will have supplied to them. That code indicates to the DVLA that you consent to the DVLA divulging your personal data to the hire company. So how do you acquire that code? To obtain your 'licence check code' you will have to know your National Insurance number, so remember to make a note of this before going abroad. You will need also your driver licence number and your post code. The licence check code will be made of 8 characters comprising numbers and upper and lower code letters, which you will then pass to the car rental company. This code you intend to apply for can be no longer than 72 hours before the transaction. So if longer than 72 hours, you will have to apply to the DVLA all over again, so bear this in mind if you are travelling to other time zones where your flight may have been delayed. To obtain your code go to gov.uk/view-driving-licence ... alternatively telephone 03000 083 0013. Even if your car hire was arranged several months ago before taking your holiday, in Britain the rental company is legally obliged to follow the implementation of these rules as from this week, however abroad you may still be able to use your paper licence. So my advice is not to destroy your paper licence, but take it abroad with you, for it will make hiring a car a little easier. But, if you have destroyed your paper licence already and you forgot to obtain your 'licence check code' prior to travelling abroad, not all is lost. With your consent, the rental company may contact DVLA on your behalf, but the administration fee and cost of an international call to the DVLA could even cost you more than the car rental. 
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

On June 2nd high winds blew across Capel carrying lashes of rain. Two local residents eyed the bad weather and decided to defy it. Dressed in best bib and tucker – very smart dresses and jackets, one with a big hat, the other with a feathery fascinator – they set off to Canterbury. Her Majesty the Queen had graciously allowed the WI to hold a tea party in her garden to celebrate the centenary of the founding of the UK WI. Guests of honour were the Duchess of Cornwall, Countess of Essex, Duchess of Gloucester and Princess Alexandra. Tickets were limited to one per Institute and a reserve, so Jayne and Caroline were lucky to secure tickets.

The day was a real treat – as we approached London the skies cleared, the rain stopped and the wind dropped. We arrived in plenty of time and slowly walked towards the Palace, much to the interest of the tourists who were busy videoing all the ladies in their finery. A sudden gust of wind whipped off one of our two lady's hat and blew it into the road. While his companions kept the camera running one hero darted into the traffic, retrieved the hat and gallantly returned it to its owner to the applause of fellow tourists. He was suitably rewarded with a beaming smile and grateful thanks.

Through the Palace and out onto the terrace where the Gardens, with two bandstands, three marquees for tea and, discretely out of sight, the lavatories, opened up before us.

We were free to roam and took full advantage of the opportunity. Then the band struck up the National Anthem, we formed a guard of honour and waited to see the four ladies of the moment. It seemed an age while we waited and the Royal party spent time talking with many of the ladies there. Eventually the Duchess of Cornwall appeared right in front us wearing a smart navy coat and matching two tone hat and a charming smile. The other Royals were also beautifully dressed and seemed to be enjoying the occasion.

Time for our tea arrived - a slick self-service operation. Holding an oblong china plate, with a recess to hold a cup, we helped ourselves to crust-less sandwiches (ham and tomato, egg and cress and mint and cucumber) scones with cream and jam and an array of cakes. One housekeeper said how much nicer it was to see so many colourful outfits compared with the conventional suits men wore at Garden Parties.

Before we knew it, it was time for the Royals to leave. Once again we lined up as they walked passed and were surprised when the Duchess of Cornwall spoke to us as she passed by.

With still an hour before the official end we wandered around some more, talked to yet more ladies and found a sunny spot to sit – we had an hour to wait before we were due to board our coach home. The excellent organisation of the day was illustrated by the ease with which we found our coach, one of 187.

Tired feet and worn out bodies we settled comfortably back in our seats and relived the afternoon while travelling back. So thank you members for sending us, thank you East Kent Federation for organising transport and thank you Mam for allowing us to party in your garden.
