From the Vicarage

Beards are fashionable; two priests serving culturally mixed parishes in East London have grown beards; the Bishop of London has commended them for reaching out to the culture of the majority of their parishioners, pointing out that in some cultures a beard is seen as a mark of holiness. But not every newspaper that ran the story last month explained that his original article in the *Church Times* was a learned discussion of the Church's changing attitudes to beards through the ages. '**Reach out to Muslims by growing a beard, bishop tells the clergy**' one headline ran - even though that wasn't exactly what he said. Like the Bishop, I also have a beard. I probably grew mine at about the time that he grew his. Unlike him I wasn't staying in a monastery in Egypt. Aged twenty, training to be a teacher and facing a stint in an inner city school that autumn, I realised that some of my pupils would be the same age as my sister, and I was desperate not to look like their older brother. At the bus depot where I was working as a conductor for the summer, the drivers had nicknamed another young conductor 'Bearded Wonder' - but I took the risk nonetheless. To their amusement, stubble appeared on my chin until one finally told me: "*You want to shave that **** lot off!*" But I didn't. Like the Bishop, I kept it – and my beard and I have stuck together through thick and thin ever since. Now we are growing old together. Has having a beard made me wiser, holier, or done anything for community relations? To be honest, I've never thought about it until now. I must ask my Bishop what he thinks... *Brian*



CAPEL-LE-FERNE PARISH COUNCIL Summary of some items discussed at meetings on Tuesday, 16th February 2016



• Request from the public to address the Council: One item mentioned; Street Light not working in Cauldham Lane and would be reported to Kent Highways. • Neighbourhood Watch: New Community Warden, Andrew Hawkins, was introduced to Council Members by Nick Thistle from Kent Community Warden Services with apologies for inconsistency in a warden for Capel-le-Ferne. Andrew addressed the meeting indicating he will be available 2 full days per week (one day would Tuesday to incorporate the Farmers' Market for consultation on any issues you may have, plus one other day). Councillors requested further investigation on resurrecting the Speedwatch Scheme and lorry parking. A Neighbourhood Watch Information afternoon is being hosted by Councillors – further details below. • Equipment status report: Still waiting for replacement chains for swings. • Highways and Public Rights of Way: Snow Warden Details for the village noted and would be notified to Dover District Council. Flooding in Capel Street still a concern in places and would be reported to Kent Highways. Cracks in the B2011 a cause for concern and subject to consultations with Kent Highway Steward for attention. Public footpath signs missing in Capel Street (adjacent to bridge over A20) and would be reported to Kent Public Rights of Way.

• Planning: Development of Land South of New Dover Road; District Councillor Scales reported that this application may possibly be on DDC Planning Committee Agenda for their March meeting. A member of the Parish Council will be applying to speak at this meeting. Members of the public can attend these meetings and details of date when confirmed will be published via the Parish Council Website, Facebook page and Email Database. Applications granted; Erection of front and side extensions to existing garage at 47 Old Dover Road. Front porch extension at 32 Cauldham Lane. Applications being considered by Parish Council; Erection of a single storey side extension incorporating a garage, front porch extension and rear dormer roof extension with balcony (existing conservatory to be demolished) at 26 Victoria Road. Reduction in height of three Ash trees by 50% at 21 Capel Street. • Other: Concerns expressed on vehicles, in various locations, parking half on road and pavement making access for pushchairs or wheelchairs impossible - Community Warden and PCSO to be requested to investigate further. Grounds Maintenance contract for grass cutting verges on B2011 and the Playing Field awarded to Harmer Landscapes following a tender process.



For personal reasons Cherry and Jenny are retiring from the market at the end of this month, though I'm sure they will still come as customers. The Village Hall Committee will manage the Tuesday market and would like to hear from someone who is able to help. The market relies on volunteers to help. If you are new to the village it is a great way of getting to know people and the commitment can be as little as once a month and it makes an enormous difference. We particularly need help between 12.15pm and 1.00pm on the fifth Tuesday of the month – there aren't many in a year, so we're not talking a huge time commitment. If you can help please contact Cherry 255114 or Sally Cook on 077304 75838 to find out what is involved.

Last month was the 'Make One Change' challenge – a challenge to you as a consumer to make one change to the way you buy food and support your local community. If you didn't join in then you could now. If you're short on time but want to eat locally and seasonally, a box scheme is a great way to get started. Usually filled mainly with seasonal fare, sourced from local farmers, a veg box (or fruit box) will help re-inspire your cooking. One advantage of the Farmers' Market is the opportunity to talk to the stall holders. One thing I've found about all of them is how passionate they are about their products, definitely an advantage over supermarkets. It's also part of the sociability of the Market.

This month we 'meet Mike' who sells the artisan bread, usually located by the fire exit (close to the tea tables so you can look before you enjoy Ruby's refreshments). He used to be an IT consultant, commuting to London, so how on earth did he get into artisan bread? One Christmas he was given a food mixer (don't ask) with a dough hook so Mike started to experiment. Soon he was taking loaves into work and colleagues and clients really enjoyed them. With the changing economic climate, Mike found himself slightly less busy at work and having more time to make bread. His sister Nicki who sold photographs and cards at the Farmers' Market suggested he tried selling at the Market too. The rest, as they say, is history and his hobby became his business. His dining room has been converted to the mixing room (which meets food hygiene standards) and there are four ovens in the kitchen. Whilst the financial rewards are lower, he has more job satisfaction; in his words there is a certain 'je ne sais quoi' about it, even after 6 years. Mike also admits that he works harder now than when he commuted to London. As well as Capel he goes to three other local markets, though Capel is the only weekly. We're lucky Cherry, Jenny and Mick decided to set ours up as a weekly event. Diners at local restaurants may be unaware, but Mike supplies several of them. Looked up 'artisan bread' on the internet and Jamie Oliver says: "Not all bread is created equal. You don't need to be a baker, a foodie or even fully awake to notice that tearing into crusty, freshly-baked loaf is a lot nicer than the supermarket sliced variety. It's a term you see a lot in the food world these days, along with 'craft', 'fresh' and the vaguest of all, 'real'. They're usually used to signify care, expertise and quality of ingredients, the way we closely monitor every single handmade loaf, like protective parents, to make sure it comes out beautifully. In short, it's very well-bred bread". This sounds just like Mike's approach to his bread. He uses pure ingredients, just flour, water, yeast and salt and for specific tastes the appropriate ingredients, such as chilies in his chili bread. No additives, no added sugar, no fat and definitely no preservatives. He even gets up at 3 in the morning to ensure the bread is as fresh as possible. Certainly the quality of the bread is evident in the taste – try some and find out for yourself. He assures me that, with no fat and no added sugar, it is not 'fattening'. In fact he is an active member of the Real Bread Campaign and his bread follows all their 'rules'. And his prices? Of course they cannot compete with the mass produced preservative-containing sliced white in the supermarket, but then they don't compete on taste. On the other hand they are competitive with quality handmade breads full of flavour and without preservatives or additives. In addition to his bread, his stall groans under his other homemade produce - sausage rolls, gala pies, brawn (so much easier if some else has made it), scotch eggs and my personal favourite - cheese and bacon 'turnover' croissant filled with bacon and cheese. I usually get to the market early enough to have one for breakfast to go with my cup of tea; I think of it as my weekly treat. Mike's other home produce is smoked goods – fish, particularly salmon, occasionally cheese. If there is something you specifically require, whether a flavour of bread or a smoked item please ask him. He describes Capel's Farmers' Market as friendly and that he now knows many of the people who come. He would like more people to say hello so maybe this article will give you something to talk about. After all he is near the tea tables and so is easy to get to.

The range of produce at the market is expanding cheese and pates (as well as Mike's) have been appearing on the tables, new features are 'almost' ready meals – all the ingredients ready for you to just cook and serve together – and Sandys has returned with her Mauritian dishes. The new 'managers' are working to ensure a range of produce for you to buy. Elsewhere Derek is selling the eggs - often double yokers and larger than the average size in the supermarket. He collects them from the farm immediately before setting his stall up in the hall, what you could call fresh.

Don't forget the Crafts Section back last month after their extended Christmas break and the postal service is provided as a community service. We also provide a photocopying service for just 10p per copy. In the lobby are two trolleys and a bookcase full of books and a table full of jigsaw puzzles for just a donation.

The Village Community Warden and/or our PCSO usually visit the market to answer any questions. At the moment the KCC Mobile Library attends just outside the car park, at 12 Noon every week and on the third Tuesday morning of each month the Chairman and the Clerk of the Parish Council are in the old Post Office room, available for anyone to talk to about any concerns in the village. So, as you can see, we are more than just a Farmers Market but a real Community based project!
