<u>From the Vícarage</u>

I didn't wear robes. I didn't read the Burial Service. In fact, I wasn't sure quite what to do – the Church of England doesn't tell its ministers what to do at the funeral of a butterfly.

In February I told you about a butterfly I rescued from a school hall just before Christmas. It should have been hibernating, and so I put it in a box in my loft, hoping that it might hibernate there. When one warm spring afternoon a Peacock butterfly came to sunbathe on the garden path it led me to check on our friend – but in the box was no living butterfly, just a sad little corpse.

Committing it to a flower bed, I thought of the lives this amazing little creature had touched - the pupils who had willed it to live, a friend who told me that she had wept at my story, and another who kindly rang to discuss with me what I had written.

When someone becomes a priest, they often order a special stole (the thing priests wear over their shoulders at services) to mark the occasion. Mine has gold Jerusalem crosses to symbolise life's journey -I wear it at baptisms and weddings. A friend chose butterflies for hers. She felt that it summed up her life - crawling like a caterpillar through some tough times when younger, then growing and changing until emerging as someone ready to fly, so to speak.

The book of Revelation, sometimes read at funerals, describes a heavenly city as a place of light and life to which we're all invited. I don't know if there butterflies in Heaven, but I sometimes think that butterflies describe all of us – crawling like caterpillars through this world, but with the possibility of greater things to come in the next. **Brian**



Capel has an active community and the village hall is well used, whether by short mat bowl or the Radio Controlled Car Club or by the other various organisations who meet for sports or leisure activities. There is something for all ages. Details of these are in the hall. Some, like pre-school are in the hall several times a week, others, like the gardeners show are quarterly events. If you are new to the village or recently retired there are lots of opportunities to get involved, either on a social basis or to join some of the committees. Details are in the hall or in Grapevine.

* There is some capacity for private hiring, so if you would like to organise a party come and have a look round. There are two halls, which can be hired separately or together. The main hall has plenty of tables and chairs and there is still space for dancing or running round. A PA system means you can hear the music or speaker if you have one – we are happy to show people how to use it. There is a stage with curtains - you could use this for the disco, band, speaker or you could put some chairs there so adults can sit and watch the children run around on the main floor. For AV events there is an electrically driven projection screen, whilst for that very special party there is a net to let release balloons. The small hall is perfect for more intimate groups or meetings, or can be used as the chill out space or food/drink service area. Both halls have use of the kitchen – including instant boiling water (capacity up to 100 cups in 15 minutes) and plenty of china, mugs and cups. A separate hand washing sink complies with Food Hygiene Regulations. The electrically operated shutter allows you to close the kitchen off so your guest can party on while the washer uppers tidy up.

Hire either or both halls, depending on how much space you need. Licenced for most things (except hypnosis and boxing) including sale of alcohol, PRS, raffles. If you would like to start a new club or activity then talk to the letting secretary about when a regular booking can be made.

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

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The 2014 Care Act update.

I have made a précis of what I believe the Care Act may mean to you now or at some possible stage in the future of your life. The Care Act, which comes into being as from April 2015, means lots of different things for different people. It depends on your needs, but can include things like help to get out of bed, get dressed or washed, help with eating or cooking meals or caring for others. Care and support comes from many different people, family and friends or members of the community. Central and County Government HELP to pay for SOME care and support, DEPENDING on your financial situation! The guidance states that Councils must give information and advice to everyone who wants it. This concerns the services that supply "well-being" and what is important to people who use them.

Key changes expected in 2016 will be a cap on care costs being £72,000 for those who develop needs above 25 years, but free lifetime care if needs develop from early years to 25 years. Change to Capital thresholds, extended means tests. £27,000 for people living at home and those in residential care whose home is disregarded! £118,000 for people in residential care (unless former home disregarded)! Lower threshold expected to be £17,000 (i.e. totally ignored).

From 2016 if a person wants to take advantage of the Care Cost Cap, they must have an assessment to determine WHAT AMOUNT should be used towards the cap. This will apply to new self-funders AFTER this date AND ALSO existing funders-but the clock will only start ticking from April 2016. (IT WILL NOT BE RETROSPECTIVE).

Not all self-funders will meet the national minimum eligibility criteria.

Those in residential care, perhaps 10%, will not meet the criteria. HOWEVER, they may have been in care for a long time so a LIGHT TOUCH assessment, a proportionate response. For those in the community, a more in depth assessment is needed to test their eligibility and which emphasises (if realistic in the individual circumstances) what can be done to maximise independence, such as equipment and other aides to improve quality of life.

What are the eligibility criteria? 1) Needs arise from or related to a physical or mental impairment or illness.

2) Unable to achieve two or more specified outcomes. 3) Significant impact on well-being as a consequence.

This actual piece of legislation extends to just over 1000 pages, so there will be many important areas to address specific issues in caring for an individual and equally important, for people like me, who also perform a role as a carer, to look after either the terminally ill, the severely disabled or frail ageing population, there can be assistance for the carer too.

The purpose of this article is to inform you of this new piece of legislation, because whilst reading it you may think "I'm aged 20, 30, 40 it does not affect me, I don't need to know about this," take it from me, it will impact upon everyone, at some stage in their life, from the healthy young motorcyclist who has a serious injury accident and losses a limb, to the person aged 30 who abuses drugs or alcohol and suffers mental illness or liver disease, to the person aged 40 who may be struck down with a stroke resulting in life long brain damage, to the 50 year old who may have early dementia or terminal cancer. May be you are the lucky one who evades such health issues, but then they may be a member of your family for whom you become the carer.

Finally I have been the District Councillor for Temple Ewell and Lydden since 2010 and due to my heavy workloads as a County Councillor and performing a role as carer too I have decided to not stand for re-election on the 7 May 2015 elections, but I wish my successor well, from which ever political persuasion they may be aligned to and if only to say that at this level of politics, my view is that the politics should be

consigned way into the background, for it is all about the community and how we can maintain or improve the quality of life for the community. The role has been "interesting" to say the least and I shall continue in my role as a County Councillor in assisting and supporting which ever candidate is chosen by the majority of the community.



<u>Summary of some items discussed at meetings on</u> <u>Tuesday, 21st April, following the Annual Parish Meeting</u>

<u>and presentation of the Chairman's Report for 2014-2015 (See Page 9)</u> • <u>Request from the public to address the Council</u>: Resident Peter Butler addressed the Councillors on three concerns; parking on pavements, making it difficult for wheelchair/pushchair users – PCSO Gretel May would monitor the situation and request offenders to reflect the situation of inconsiderate parking; the provision of drop kerbs – which was an item already discussed with the Kent Highways and will be pursued further and; the condition of the verge at Courtwood Roundabout (adjacent to the refreshment vehicle where lorries park) had damaged area and now resembles a "ploughed field" – this was outside Parish boundary, but had also been mentioned to Kent Highways in the hope of providing bollards. • <u>Equipment status report</u> – Refurbishment of basketball court goal ends and swings now complete. Further work to climbing frame will be carried out when replacement parts have been received from manufacturer. Fencing to petanque area and memorial will be completed by the time this newsletter is delivered. Request by users for a pathway around petanque court was discussed, but due to this being originally researched and following a meeting held with interested parties, the amount of fencing was ordered and pre-cut ready for installation, also this request held a financial implication and was agreed by Councillors that present arrangements would have to remain and if still required, funding for changes would need to be sourced. Shades to playing field lights had now been altered satisfactorily and 4 new litter bins had been agreed with Dover District Council to be placed in areas of most need - one in Green Lane, 2 in Winehouse Lane and one in Old Dover Road (Dover end).</u>

Crime Reports (PCSO Gretel May)/Neighbourhood Watch – Nothing to report. • Traffic/Road Improvements, Highways & Public Rights of Way – Scooter route and pathway from playing field to rear school gate being discussed with Public Rights of Way personnel. • Development of Land South of New Dover Road – see page 10 and 11 on Parish Council feedback response letter to Developers proposed plans. Here is an open letter to "dog owning residents" from a "concerned resident".

"We are lucky in England to have a network of public footpaths and the right to go along them at any time. However with those rights there are responsibilities and for dog owners this means cleaning up after your dog. The footpath behind Capel School is becoming increasingly covered in excrement and in bags containing it. It is unpleasant to be able to see it, smell it and tread in it, and it is making it increasingly difficult for anyone with small children, pushchairs or limited mobility of vision to use with any pleasure and yet this is supposed to be a footpath for all, not just inconsiderate dog walkers.

Additionally, as well as on the footpath itself, owners are allowing dogs into the field to do their toilet. This is not just grass. This is a planted crop, potentially a crop for human consumption. The land belongs to the farmer. There seems to have been an increase in dog walkers marching right across the field. We would be the first to complain at someone who detoured from the pavement and meandered across our front flowerbeds and lawn. There would be shouting and calls to the Dog Warden if you saw an owner letting their dog foul your property. Just because the farmer is not there to notice you, does not mean that it is ok to do it. If the problem is too much of an issue, farmers often fence the footpaths off. This leaves an area with semi-rural 'alleyways' where dogs, owners and all the excrement can be contained. Not a nice thought for Capel.

There have been objections to the new housing proposed for Capel and when it goes ahead there is a chance it will add to the problem as people moving to the area may be led by example. So thank you to the dog walkers of Capel who conscientiously clear up after their dogs, who don't consider it too much trouble to detour to one of the many bins in the area or take it home. It is hard to imagine how horrible the path would be if they did not. If we all help to put our own house in order by keeping our paths and fields clean, there is a chance that we will stop even more fouling and can all be proud of how pleasant Capel can be to live in. "


This year will be one to remember, if anyone didn't know of Capel le Ferne, or where it was, they certainly do now. It was some twenty odd years ago that the Queen Mother came to Capel to open the Battle of Britain Memorial. This year we had the icing on the cake, Her Majesty the Queen and HRH Prince Philip made a gracious visit to open the newly built visitors centre, the Wing, at the Battle of Britain site. I had the privilege as Chairman of the Council to meet the Queen and the Duke. The school children of Capel will I'm sure will never forget the day the Queen came to Capel. Although the day was wet and low cloud put a damper on the air display, the Queen insisted in going out on the balcony of the Wing and to greet the crowd that had gathered to see her. In June we have the climax to the Battle of Britain Memorial, the 75th anniversary of the conflict, and we have been informed that the fly past will contain as many Spitfires and Hurricanes that can be mustered.

My twelve years as a Councillor seem to have gone far too quickly. It has been an honour and a privilege to serve the village as Chairman and to have such lovely colleagues as Councillors to make the job such a joy to do. 

Proposed Development - "Grasslands", Capel-le-Ferne

Further to our letter of 29th March 2015, please find below the points that Capel-le-Ferne Parish Councillors wish to be brought to your attention for consideration.

1. Southern Boundary Buffer:

Policy LA 24 with regard to - "a landscape buffer of planting is created along the southern boundary". A landscape buffer as described will do nothing to mask 4 bedroom properties proposed, to flank the southern aspect of the site. The patch of 'grassland' proposed appears to be an open area, not a naturalised, undisturbed, managed grassland area. The agreed portion of land for development needed to be cleared, but the number of trees/woodland taken down and the impact to birds and wildlife seems excessive and concerns were expressed at the time on the lack of prior notification regarding this. Most of the existing trees and vegetation have been removed from the north of the site. It was anticipated that there would be a retention and expansion of existing hedge along the Old Dover Road, needed to provide the correct bio diversity for flora and fauna associated with chalk grassland. The buffer planting will provide screening of the development from the Heritage Coast, AONB and SSSI. Plans should include details of how the hedge will be maintained. Additionally, a buffer between the houses and the chalk grassland will in some measure address the loss of trees and shrubs by clearance of the site.

2. Precise Boundary between the developed and undeveloped parts of the site

In the preamble to Policy LA 24 it mentions: the developable portion of the site amounts to 1.42ha. As the total area of the site is 3ha, 1.42ha means that less than 50% of the site should be developed. This is certainly not the impression given. Many are very concerned that although the Local Area Plan showed about 50% of the site being developed, the trees have been cleared from about 80% of the land, despite the requirement for a screen to be in place between the development and Old Dover Road. This makes it look like intentions are to develop far closer to Old Dover Road than the plan provided for. The developable portion of the site appears to have enlarged and this is not in line with the agreements for the site, following the examination. Before any planning application can be considered it should be demonstrated that the boundary is established in line with the ecological evidence as required in the LADP.

3. Boundaries between existing residential developments

Capel Court Caravan Park and Helena Road

The proposed 4 bedroom properties to the East and West of the site will invade the privacy of the tenants of Capel Court Caravan Park and Helena Road. 4 Bedroomed properties do not comply with Policy LA 24 with regard to: "Sensitive design with regard to height in order to ensure the development does not have an adverse impact on the AONB and countryside". Better privacy is required to Helena Road, particularly where the houses are in the corner and close to the bridleway. Most of Capel properties are bungalows, interspersed with a few two-storey properties. These town houses are not in keeping with Capel and 2½ storeys are too high. Further along from the development there is a residential caravan park, which will also be disadvantaged as they will be severely overlooked. The proposed houses are higher than expected when compared with surrounding properties. Surrounding areas have a variety of roof heights and it would be preferred that the development echo this The schematic shows roof heights in line with the minority rather than the average height and as such is not in keeping with the majority of local residences. Capel-le-Ferne has extreme weather conditions at times. Properties, particularly on the cliff tops, have problems with prevailing rain driving into these, very real, issues should be given, for the long term benefit of the residents of the properties.

4. Bridleway to East Boundary

The proposed plan shows the public bridleway incorrectly placed. The bridleway traverses through the grounds of London House at the cliff-top; not to the side of it, as is shown, i.e. the bridleway actually goes straight. Concerns about the accuracy of the bridleway as shown on the proposed development plan were expressed by many residents, notably that there is no "dog leg" in it. There is some history of legal action to establish exactly where it goes. At present the Parish Council are unable to say if any of the development is encroaching onto the bridleway.

5. Housing Mix

Proposal as it stands is predominately 4/5 bedroom properties with a few 2/3 bedroom properties. Thoughts are that there is a need by the village and surrounding areas to a requirement for more 2/3 bedroom properties, rather than 4/5 bedroom properties and would propose to switch the allocation accordingly. Not in line with the agreements for the site following the examination. They were supposed to be of a density and height that would minimise the impact of the site. Also, because these are larger properties, they have been allocated larger outside spaces which, contributes to the site being so large. These larger properties are also in far larger quantities than the more affordable 2 and 3 bedroom properties; which would be a much more practical option for most buyers. It is understood that Housing Associations are not interested in managing the portion of the development needed to be allocated for this purpose. Perhaps "Help to Buy Schemes" may be more appropriate in this case, to enable villagers to downsize and continue to live or raise their families in their home environments, with their support networks around them. It was also intimated that 1 and 2 bedroom flats for retired of the likes to a McCarthy Stone development would be beneficial.

6. <u>Traffic</u>

Concerns about the traffic and speeding – the B2011 (New Dover Road) is dangerous. The schematic shows the road as being straight when there is actually a bend in it restricting visibility. Vehicular access to the site is achieved from the New Dover Road which is designed to minimise the loss of existing trees and vegetation, in order to screen the site from the adjacent AONB located to the north of the site.

The access from the B2011 is unsafe. The speed of traffic on the B2011 is excessive, despite the Parish Council's efforts to resolve. There have been a large number of near-fatal accidents on this road. The proposed site is on a slight bend and the line of sight from the site, to cross the road is not good. Capel-le-Ferne is renowned for being foggy which exacerbates the problem here. Any tried and tested road layouts will not work here as vision can be extremely compromised this near to the cliff top (sea mist and fog often surround the cliffs). A greater study and understanding of the local microclimate is needed.

Although designated a "B" road the New Dover Road has the traffic characteristics of an "A" road. Kent County Council has given the Parish Council data of volumes, speeds and flows of traffic. These may be at odds with the traffic report presented when the LADP was examined in 2014. While not experts, the Parish Council wishes to see a focus on traffic management and safety in this area. This includes;

- *i.* Provision of an appropriate turning lane/inclusion of a slip way for Folkestone bound traffic entering the site i.e. safer ingress/ egress, so that they could pull over into it before turning left into the site (therefore minimising the chance of rear-impact accidents in the fog); a lit 'pelican' crossing for residents, which would also help to generally slow the traffic, and thinking about how to stop vehicles overtaking on the wrong side of the islands at night. If this entails removal of the hedge then replanting further within the site is expected.
- *ii.* The 40mph speed limit being moved back to either Courtwood roundabout or Winehouse Lane i.e. extension of the 40 mph speed limit zone on both sides of the village (to Old Dover Road on the East at a minimum and to the Valiant Sailor on the West).
- *iii.* These should be in place at the earliest opportunity to enable safe entry/exit of construction traffic

7. Other aspects noted that would be appreciated if taken into consideration

- Solar and ecological buildings
- Lack of capacity in the local primary school
- Improvement of telephone/internet provision
- Provision of medical care, i.e. doctors, dentist, chemist (at present travel to neighbouring towns of Folkestone and Dover is required)
- Current infrastructure insufficient, including drainage, water and gas pressures low

Thank you for taking the time to read these hopefully constructive responses to your proposed development to Land South of New Dover Road, Capel-le-Ferne.

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
