
Capel Church Hall Fund-Programme for 2015

New chairs should now be available in the small hall. They cost more than we would usually pay but are much more comfortable, particularly for meetings. They are not suitable for craft events where glue and or glitter is used – please use the old plastic chairs for anything like that.

WHEN THE DOORS AND WINDOWS. We are grateful that hirers are considering neighbours. If the volume is raised then doors and windows should be kept shut. Music should stop at 11.30. (Unless a successful application for an extension has been made.) REMEMBER THE HALL IS WELL USED BY MANY RESIDENTS AND IF WE LOSE THE LICENCES THE IMPACT WILL BE FELT BY ALL THE ORGANISATIONS MEMBERS.

Capel has an active community and the village hall is well used, whether by the Brownies, Car Club or Gardeners' Club. There is something for all ages and tastes and there is availability for private hire. Details of hiring for the current and next months are in the hall. If you are new to the village or recently retired there are lots of opportunities to get involved either on a social basis or to join some of the committees. Most organisations are happy for you to attend taster session to see if the activities suit you. Details are in the hall or in Grapevine. * There is some capacity for private hiring, so if you would like to organise a party come and have a look round. There are two halls, which can be hired separately or together. The main hall has plenty of tables and chairs and there is still space for dancing or running round. A professional PA system means you can hear the music or speaker if you have one - we are happy to show people how to use it, in fact we'd rather give a demonstration that have someone find out by trial and error how it works - or doesn't. Problems have been reported when microphones are not switched off after use. Trustees are therefore suggesting that the batteries are removed when not in use and hirers bring batteries for their event. This will ensure that the microphone will last the duration of your event. There is a stage with curtains – you could use this for the disco, band, speaker or you could put some chairs there so adults can sit and watch the children run around on the main floor. For AV events there is an electrically driven projection screen, whilst for that very special party there is a net to release balloons. The small hall is perfect for more intimate groups or meetings, or can be used as the chill out space or food/drink service area. Both halls have use of the kitchen – including instant boiling water (capacity up to 100 cups in 15 minutes) and plenty of china, mugs and cups. A separate hand washing sink complies with Food Hygiene Regulations. The electrically operated shutter allows you to close the kitchen off so your guests can party on while the washer uppers tidy up. Hire either or both halls, depending on how much space you need. Licenced for most things (except hypnosis and boxing) including sale of alcohol, PRS, raffles. If you would like to start a new club or activity then talk to the letting secretary about when a regular booking can be made.



Clerk reported one feedback from the surgery @ Farmers' Market, on trees being cut overhanging garden from public footpath - Clerk to report to PROW. • Equipment status report: Swings chains to be replaced; Cross Trainer bearings to be renewed; new brass plaques on flower boxes fitted. • Crime Reports (PCSO Gretel May) and Neighbourhood Watch: A number of vehicles reported abandoned in village; Anglian Home Improvements operating a "persistent" promotion company undertaking canvassing for roof repairs reported; bus shelter Helena Road damaged and reported. • Traffic/Road Improvements: Still waiting Kent County Council decision on 20mph status for Capel Street. 

Our usual 'reporter' was sunning herself in the Mediterranean when we had our October meeting so it has fallen to her delegate to share our news this month. We were delighted to welcome 2 more visitors to the meeting which began with a presentation by Geoff Turner. The title - The Place to Spend a Happy Day – gave no insight into what would follow.

Intrigued we settled down in the new hall chairs (very comfortable thank you village hall committee) and the wonders of computer wizardy took us to Rosherville Gardens which were near Gravesend. In their heyday they were one of the largest and most popular Victorian Pleasure Gardens visited by Londoners who travelled down by steamboat. Begun in the late 1800s they were built originally as gardens in an old chalk pit but with the passage of time (and to make them financially viable) more entertainment was provided.

The gardens must have been quite a place to visit with a bear pit, lake, statues and much you would associate with large gardens. Later entertainment included dancing (there was a dance instructor), a tightrope walker, fireworks and hot air balloons. The introduction to all this was illustrated by Victorian postcards before progressing to talk about the stage performers. None of our members were old enough to remember actual performances but had heard of the acts.

The magic of computerisation brought Harry Relph (aka Little Tich) dancing across the stage in shoes almost as long as he was tall 4foot 6 inches. The room burst into song as this was followed by Florrie Forde the original singalong artist with she's only a Lassie from Lancashire, has anybody seen Kelly and down at the old Bull and Bush (both viewable on You Tube). There were fleeting pictures of Marie Lloyd herself but the singing of my old man said follow the van. Performances may have been before any of us were born but in the pre television era singing was a big part of life. All good sing a longs for some of the more mature members but completely mysterious to our younger ones. As a member who may have not known the songs Nikki gave the vote of thanks, commenting on the tunefulness of the assembled company. Well, we do try to cover a range of topics and cater to a variety of tastes.

The agenda was "topsy-turvy" and as soon as the speaker finished we had the competition -a poem which makes me happy - with entries read by members. I said read but in fact some were recited - Lyn with one written when she was at school and Sheila with a family favourite. Good luck with that, if you win your name will be on a board where you come into the market. Our own (Lady) Cherry and Jenny are usually on hand to greet you when you arrive and if you have any questions they will be able to answer them. Also in the entrance hall are jigsaw puzzles and books which you are able to 'borrow' for a small donation. If you are a member the Kent County Library parks outside from 12 noon and you are able to borrow return and renew your library books there, rather than trek down to the main library in the town.



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



Street lighting – The deadline for all responses is Sunday, 29 November 2015. Kent residents and businesses are being asked for their views on options for street lighting across the county on whether they would prefer the current level of service provided by part-night lighting, or all-night lighting. Kent County Council has secured funding to convert the county's 118,000 street lights to Light Emitting Diode (LED) technology - which will mean annual savings of up to £5.2million for Kent's council taxpayers. The street lights will incorporate a Central Management System (CMS) that also provides flexibility by monitoring energy use, detecting faults, dimming lights and controlling the time that lights turn on and off. This is a 10-week consultation which will help inform a new street lighting policy.

KCC Budget Consultation: Managing Kent's Money Responsibly

Kent Council has launched a six week consultation campaign to explain the impending scale of the county council's budget challenge for next year.



The council estimates it needs to make £80 million of savings for the 2016/17 budget. This comes on top of savings of £433 million already made over the last five years. The council are asking people how they want their money spent in the face of increasing demands for county council services at a time of reduced funding.

The savings are required largely because of two main factors:

£58 million of additional demands being placed on the council's budget, which include: 2) • £31 million for the estimated impact of rising prices and excess demand next year. • £12 million of one-off funding from reserves and underspends which supports the current year's budget and can't be repeated. • £4 million investment in invest to save initiatives 2) The council is expecting a reduction in government funding of £33 million. As part of the campaign KCC is consulting with residents whether they would accept a small proposed increase to the council tax up to the amount permitted without a referendum currently 1.99%. KCC says a raise would contribute £11 million towards balancing the books. The consultation asks residents for

their views on this proposed increase. The county council is launching the campaign ahead of government announcements of its spending plans for the next four years at the end of November.

Kent's response to the Syrian Refugee Crisis


The Syrian Vulnerable Persons Relocation Scheme was set up in 2014, in response to the current refugee crisis emanating from Syria. Under the scheme Syrian refugees who are particularly at risk are brought to the Uk, direct from camps in the Middle East. They are given five years Humanitarian Leave to remain, which enables them to work, pay taxes and claim public funds. On 7th September, the Government announced an expansion to the scheme with a target to resettle 20,000 vulnerable refugees over the next five years. Local authority participation is key to the success of the scheme. Following the announcement of the expansion to the scheme, the issue was briefly discussed at a previous County Council meeting on the 17th September. It was acknowledged that local authorities would be expected to take the lead (on a voluntary basis) in the resettlement of the 20,000 refugees. Following discussions with Chief Executives, the County Council is working currently with District/Borough councils, Health and other key partners to agree a strategy regarding level of support to be offered. In response to the crisis there have been overwhelming offers to support refugees from members of the public, Community, voluntary organisations and businesses in Kent. Everything possible is being done to harness these offers in coordination with District and Borough Councils. Local Authorities wishing to take part in the Syrian scheme are able to state the profile of the refugees they are able to accept, both in general and in individual cases, depending upon level of need. The County Council is keen to support the scheme provided it does not add to the enormous burden it faces currently looking after the unprecedented numbers of unaccompanied asylum seeking children. Funding for the scheme is given partly upfront and partly as expenditure is incurred. This includes two months void costs to help secure accommodation and a one of allowance for health, education and if required specialist support. Initially funding for the scheme was only available for the first year, however since the 2nd October the Government will provide additional funding to assist with costs incurred in future years, though there is a possibility there may be some degree of unfunded costs in future years, which would them become a cost to the Council. It is interesting to note in relation to unaccompanied asylum seeking children, as at the 15th October 2015 only 8% have arrived from Syria, whereas 38% arrived from Eritrea and 17% from Afghanistan, 7% Sudanese and 6% Vietnamese. Due to extreme pressures on Kent's Children Services, severely exacerbated by the unprecedented numbers of unaccompanied asylum seekers children, Kent is unable to accommodate unaccompanied minors through the Syrian refugee scheme as it would be unable to meet their needs given the current circumstances.

Cyber Attack from Talk Talk, the phone and broadband provider. There is a risk that hackers could access servers stealing confidential personal data. There is a chance that the following information could be obtained:- Name/address, date of birth, email address, home/business address, telephone numbers, Talk Talk customer account information and bank or credit card details plus passwords. Be wary of any incoming emails or phone calls from Talk Talk. Should you receive a phone call claiming to be from Talk Talk wishing information or additional information, hang up immediately AND using another phone contact Talk Talk on their known numbers to verify their earlier call. It would be advised to change bank, email, shopping account and other passwords, not forgetting treat any credit/debit cards with their security code on the reverse as possibly having been compromised and consider having those changed too. Heavy Goods Vehicle drivers and freight operators are being reminded about road safety following an increase in reports of lorries parking on hard shoulders and slip roads of the M20 for rest breaks. Kent Police and our partners have noticed an increase in the number of incidents where both British and foreign-registered lorries have been found using illegal, inappropriate and unsafe parking locations. Police Officers and Traffic Officers from Highways England have been working to move offending vehicles on when it is safe and appropriate to do so.

Parking on the hard shoulder is unlawful: Superintendent Ian Hall said 'Parking on the hard shoulders and slip roads of motorways is not only unlawful but mostly unsafe for both the lorry driver themselves and other road users and we have been regularly moving on vehicles with traffic officers from Highways England. 'When we speak to HGV drivers, we try to educate them about the dangers that parking at these locations pose to themselves and other motorists. If they fail to move on or we find repeat offenders, we do look at escalating the matter to a criminal offence where tickets are issued and/or lorries are immobilised. Haulage operators and drivers are expected find adequate, safe and appropriate places to park their vehicles when drivers require rest breaks'.

Multi-agency group: A multi-agency group that includes the Police, Highways England, Local Authorities and Transport groups has been set up. The aim of the group is to take action where possible and educate companies and drivers, or where necessary take enforcement action.

Plastic card fraud

'Card not present' transactions - This is when card details are used to buy goods or services over the phone, via the internet or by mail order. Contrary to popular belief, the internet is unlikely to be the source the problem. In fact, the internet is very safe to use if you take the right precautions. This fraud occurs when people obtain details of your account from statements and receipts and then use them to buy goods or services without your knowledge. Reduce the risk:

- protect items showing account details such as statements and receipts
- discard these items with care, ideally by shredding
- check your statements for unfamiliar transactions

When using the internet:

- use a secure system to make online payments, not one that has public access
- protect your PC with security software
- only buy goods from secure websites of companies you trust
