From the Vicarage

I recently decided to leave my collar at home, find a cathedral and spend a couple of days praying, reading, and generally recharging my batteries. I chose Chelmsford - not too far away, and with the railway station, Cathedral and pleasant riverside walks all near each other. Arriving after lunch I made my way to the Cathedral. Deliberately dressed to look like an ordinary visitor rather than a vicar, I walked through the door – and straight into a graduation ceremony. I clearly wasn't supposed to be there. So I retreated back through the door, and decided to go for a walk instead.

A young woman stopped me: "Is it OK to go inside?" We started chatting. Tears welled up as she explained that she would have graduating herself had treatment for a brain tumour discovered during her studies not destroyed her ability to learn.

She asked what I was doing there – and my cover was blown. I ended up promising to pray for her. She thanked me and left, warning that if I saw her again an hour from then, she wouldn't recognise me.

By the following morning the Cathedral staff, too, had worked out who I was. After the morning Communion service I was taken to a coffee shop. There I told the Precentor about the young woman I'd met whose dreams had been so cruelly shattered, and yet who hadn't given up on life – she was working in a garden centre, and volunteering for a cancer charity. Despite her disappointment, no self-pity or brooding about what might have been for her. She had been there that day because she was genuinely glad for her friends, and wanted to wish them well. "Wow! What an amazing young woman!" he said. Amen to that.

REMEMBER THE HALL IS WELL USED BY MANY RESIDENTS AND IF WE LOSE THE LICENCES THE IMPACT WILL BE FELT BY ALL THE ORGANISATIONS MEMBERS.

Capel has an active community and the village hall is well used, whether by the WI, Parish Council or by the other various organisations who meet for sports or leisure activities. There is something for all ages. Details of these are in the hall. Some, like short mat bowls are in the hall several times a week, others, like the gardeners' show are quarterly events.

If you are new to the village or recently retired, there are lots of opportunities to get involved either on a social basis or to join some of the committees. Most organisations are happy for you to attend taster session to see if the activities suit you. Details are in the hall or in Grapevine.

* There is some capacity for private hiring, so if you would like to organise a party come and have a look round. There are two halls, which can be hired separately or together.

The main hall has plenty of tables and chairs and there is still space for dancing or running round. A professional PA system means you can hear the music or speaker if you have one – we are happy to show people how to use it, in fact we'd rather give a demonstration than have someone find out by trial and error how it works – or doesn't. Problems have been reported when microphones are not switched off after use. Trustees are therefore suggesting that the batteries are removed when not in use and hirers bring batteries for their event. This will ensure that the microphone will last the duration of your event. There is a stage with curtains – you could use this for the disco, band, speaker or you could put some chairs there so adults can sit and watch the children run around on the main floor. For AV events there is an electrically driven projection screen, whilst for that very special party there is a net to release balloons.

The small hall is perfect for more intimate groups or meetings, or can be used as the chill out space or food/drink service area. Both halls have use of the kitchen – including instant boiling water (capacity up to 100 cups in 15 minutes) and plenty of china, mugs and cups. A separate hand washing sink complies with Food Hygiene Regulations. The electrically operated shutter allows you to close the kitchen off so your guests can party on while the washer uppers tidy up. Hire either or both halls, depending on how much space you need. Licenced for most things (except hypnosis and boxing) including sale of alcohol, PRS, raffles. If you would like to start a new club or activity then talk to the letting secretary about when a regular booking can be made.

<u>Tuesday, 15th September.</u>

It is, with very great sadness, to have to inform you all that Clive Goble passed away on 9th September 2015 in hospital. Clive was a long serving Councillor and Chairman of this Council until May this year, when he decided not to stand again for election. Clive suffered two severe strokes and had pneumonia. Our sincere sympathies are to Kathy his wife and all his family. On Monday, 21st September a Catholic Requiem Mass was held at the Catholic Church of Our Lady Help of Christians, followed by burial at Hawkinge. A minutes silence in remembrance was held by Councillors at the meeting.

• Request from the public to address the Council: No requests received. Clerk reported there were no feedback points from the surgery @ Farmers' Market. • Equipment status report: Cllr: Keith Pilcher reported on his bi-monthly checks undertaken and the RoSPA full annual report carried out by Play Safety Limited, resulting in; swing chains showing signs of wear and replacements to be investigated; cost of £140 agreed to replace worn bearings on cross trainer (previously reported); circlip missing to handle bar grips of hand bike reported to contractors for replacement; undergrowth cut back still required to BMX trail and signs on fencing to be repositioned. • Crime Reports (PCSO Gretel May) and Neighbourhood Watch: Inconsiderate parking on grass verges in New Dover Road and other vicinities a cause for concern as being potential visual hazards likely to cause accidents especially in foggy/inclement weather conditions - Community Warden and PCSO would be investigating further with the District Council and Kent Highways on enforcement and legislation; Parish Council Neighbourhood Watch Team attended event see, report below; leaflets on advice and information continue to be acquired and handed out by the Team at the Farmers' Market; • Traffic/Road Improvements: Highways: Meetings being arranged between Cllrs: Brian Tutt, Keith Pilcher, Hougham Parish Council, Dover District Council, Highways England and Kent Highways to discuss concerns at Courtwood Roundabout on damage by HGV to verges, flooding, mud on the road, planters installed by Kent Highways, Operation Stack and A20 Traffic Assessment Phase; Cllr: Cherry Leppard reported worn road markings on junction Winehouse Lane/Cauldham Lane for replacement by Kent Highways; Clerk reported funding to provide tarmac pathway between playing field and rear school gate had not been forthcoming – Councillors decided to try other possibilities at a later date. • Development of Land South of New Dover Road: See Page 7 for update on Parish Council activity regarding issues raised by Councillors and Residents. • Other: Remembrance Day (11th November) - service and wreath laying ceremony being organised at the Memorial Plinth on Lancaster Avenue from 10.45am; Brass plaques now engraved for adopted flower box by local organisations and businesses and will be fitted by Cllr: Keith Pilcher. Bus shelter outside Battle of Britain Memorial Site waiting financial confirmation from Kent County Council; Reports given by Cllr: Jayne Stone on Summer Fete and Beer Festival 2015, an event for next year agreed for 23rd July 2016; Capel WI would be planting 300 daffodil bulbs on the B2011 in memory of past members and a reminder of the Village Hall Management Committee Annual General Meeting would be held on 23rd November.

News from your Parish Council Neighbourhood Watch Team

Members recently went to an event organised by the police to improve communication between the Police Force and Parish Councils. Some key information provided by Inspector Thompson is reproduced below:

- How many people visit which police stations and at what times is being reviewed; this may lead to closure or reduced opening hours of some front counters if the workload does not justify keeping them open.
- Use of 'proportionate justice' will reduce expenditure on court costs whilst still tackling minor crime. For example taking an offender who pleads guilty to court for a simple crime costs around £3,000, compared with a possible the loss as low as £5.00. Such crimes will be recorded and trends monitored. There will be a focus on top offenders.
- Many issues reported to the police can be better dealt with by other agencies, for example noise issues should be dealt with by the Local Authority and lost-property is not a legal Police responsibility.
- Use of technology to reduce data inputting by staff the on line reporting system is currently being revamped but when in operation Police staff will not need to spend time typing in the data. Similarly technology enables victims to track progress of investigations and emails can be used to keep victims up to date.
- PCSOs will be used more flexibly and more volunteers recruited. These may be as 'Special Police' or as support staff. Special police constables have the same powers as a full time Police Officer. Duties (tasks) are selected to offer an interesting and stimulating experience. More information is available on the Kent Police website or Business Centre on 01622 653653. There is a wide range of other opportunities for volunteering with the Force, contact Alex Harrington on 101.
- If the public take responsibility for themselves more Police time is available to care for victims, safeguard the vulnerable and investigate more serious crimes. For examples owners have a responsibility to ensure the security of their sheds and garages.
- There is plenty of information available on the internet to signpost people to the most appropriate organisation, for example housing associations have more powers to deal with anti-social behaviour than the Police do.

Land South of New Dover Road, Capel-le-Ferne

The Parish Council are very disappointed with the way in which the developers have conducted themselves during the site clearance over recent weeks, leading up to the present on site position. The Council are disgusted with the unsupervised visits and barbaric clearance with little or no warning to the devastation on site.

Numerous communications have been sent from the Parish Council to Dover District Council Planning Department, bringing to their attention the sequence of events. The Councillors would like to share this with you.

<u>Parish Council to Planning Department:</u> Thank you for your email received yesterday, Tuesday, 25th August, with a copy of Jarvis Homes email dated 20th August. This was forwarded to the Councillors and via our local database of residents and Facebook page to inform everyone this work was taking place on site from today and approximately 2-3 weeks. As you can imagine, this has <u>not</u> met with approval, in that the comments received from both Parish Councillors and Parishioners are as follows:

- Surely they have removed sufficient trees already from the area to be developed
- Concerned with the word tree clearance.... assume DDC have approved this work? We don't want all the trees lost with survey work.
- Bit worried reading this, removing wooded area adjacent to Old Dover Road, it was my understanding that in the initial housing Development brief, the wooded area immediately adjacent to the Old Road was to be left to screen development. If so Jarvis homes appeared to completely disregarded the wooded area on their Site Plans shown at the March presentation meeting in the Village Hall(trying to win hearts and minds), site plan showed the trees cleared, and open grass area between site boundary and Old Dover Road. The site was cleared of approximately 80% of vegetation, (what I call site creep, question who is over-seeing they adhere to the site boundaries in the initial brief). This should be overseen by an independent body, not Jarvis Homes.
- Does this mean that the Development as put Forward by Jarvis Homes has been given the Green Light to go ahead? I would appreciate your earliest clarification so I can inform my neighbours who live along the Eastern Boundary of Capel Court Park and whose privacy will be severely breached by this development. (Have informed this resident no decision has yet been notified to the Parish Council).
- Is there going to be a creation of reptile hibernacula?

Look forward to receiving your comments on this Rachel, as soon as possible, in order to reassure everyone this is being monitored by Dover District Council Planning Department and/or someone representing the local environment and Coastal Heritage, together with Capel-le-Ferne Parish and Dover District interests.

Planning Department to Parish Council: Thank you for your email, I will try and respond to the queries in the order raised;

- The site has been allocated for development and therefore the general principle of the residential development on the northern part of the site and the chalk grassland on the southern part of the site is acceptable in principle.
- The southern part of the site needs to be returned to chalk grassland and this will involve scrubbing out some of the trees. This in itself does not require planning permission but because it is included within the planning application a detailed ecological survey has been submitted, the Council's ecology officer is satisfied with its content.
- An indicative landscaping plan has also been submitted, this shows areas where woodland will be retained and enhanced, mostly around the side boundaries and showing an open area in the centre of the southern half the site. If planning permission is granted a detailed landscaping plan showing species, sizes, numbers, siting of replacement trees and plants will be required together with a management plan.
- The northern boundary of the site will be provided with a structural landscaping buffer to screen the development from the AONB, however there will be views through the development site across the new chalk grassland to the AONB to the south. The built impact of the development on the southern side (Old Dover Road) will be softened by the separation distance of the grassland and by the wooded areas which will be retained/enhanced on the side boundaries.
- Planning permission has not yet been granted, it will be referred to the Planning Committee for a decision and this is likely to be towards the end of the year.
- Reptiles are a protected species and as such the applicant is duty bound to ensure that reptiles are not harmed as a consequence of the development.

The Councillors are not happy with this response and are now following up with a meeting of two Councillors (Keith Pilcher and Chris Norris) with Rachel Humber, a Principal Planner, to strongly present all our concerns, to clarify and seek reassurance on the various issues raised by Councillors and residents.

In summary, the Parish Council are continuing to lobby on this, together with the recent <u>amendments (dated 15th September)</u> to the original application that can be viewed online at

A "working party" of all Councillors has met to look at these amendments and in due course, following the meeting with a Principal Planner, the Parish Council response will be published for all to see.

A lot of effort and time is being put in by your Parish Councillors on this and they cannot stress enough how much they would appreciate your help to support them, by also addressing your opinions, concerns and comments to the DDC Planning Department and if required in the future, visually by attending any public meetings.



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

Head of Community Safety, Lee Rose, said: "Chimneys can turn into blazing furnaces when they catch fire, causing thousands of pounds worth of damage and putting your home, family and business at risk.

"We're launching the <u>clean sweep alert system</u> – it's safe and easy-to-use and you can sign up in seconds. It will send you a message to remind you to get your chimney cleaned and inspected if you haven't already had it done yet. That way you can make sure it's free from debris and in good working order before you light it when the weather cools down. This will help to prevent fires and structural damage to your property."

If you have a chimney, open fire, wood burner, Aga or other 'real flame' appliance, it's vital that you ensure it is properly installed and serviced by competent engineers, so you can safely curl up next to a warm, cosy fire throughout the colder winter months.

Lee added: "The risk of carbon monoxide poisoning can occur at any time, in any home or enclosed space. Blocked flues and chimneys can prevent carbon monoxide escaping, allowing it to reach dangerous levels. Make sure you don't get caught out by a silent killer. Proper care and maintenance will allow you to enjoy the benefits of using your fireplace safely and, as it will run more efficiently, it could save you money too!

"Don't take chances with safety, <u>sign up for our free clean sweep alert</u> and get your chimney and flues inspected and swept annually. Follow our common sense chimney fire safety advice and keep your home and business fires burning safely this winter." Notes to editors
